## **Museum Closing its Doors This Fall**

**Weddle and Gilmore Architects** are busy finalizing the plans for the renovation of the museum's lobby, public restrooms and exhibit gallery, as well as the construction of a new multi-purpose room. As the design phase of the renovation project comes to an end, the staff is preparing for the closure of the museum this fall.

All the artifacts will be removed from the exhibit gallery and placed safely in storage before demolition begins. Some parts of the current exhibits will find new homes. The photographic and text panels in the main exhibit area will be re-installed at the Pyle Adult Center. Some of the murals also may be saved for later use. According to **Dan Miller**, Exhibits Coordinator, "We may very well use some of the relevant photo murals in the new exhibit hall; and we're glad that some of the interpretive panels will live on in one of our sister facilities nearby."

In the archives, all the shelving will have to be covered in order to prevent dust and other airborne debris from contaminating the boxes of material that are stored there. Similar measures will have to be taken with the three-dimensional artifacts. The staff is bracing for a challenging, but exciting time. "Every day will probably bring a new adventure. The noise and relative chaos of the demolition phase will be the worst," states **Amy Douglass**, Museum Administrator. "But once that is over, we will get to witness the transformation of the museum and that will be very rewarding."

Although the museum will be closed to general visitation for over a year, public services will continue. The Petersen House Museum will be the focus for programs and tours. The Third Thirstday Night Cafés will be held in the Connections Café at the Tempe Public Library and the Tempe Historical Society's lunch talks will continue in the library's program room when they resume this fall. Exhibits will be installed in other Tempe venues like City Hall and the Tempe Public Library.

In addition, research services and photographic reproductions will be offered on an appointment basis, but it may not be necessary to come to the museum. According to (Continued on page 2)

## **New Exhibit / City Hall Gallery**

Jewel in the Desert: Getting Acquainted with Our Muslim Neighbors Tempe has a significant Muslim population whose diversity, contributions, and presence enrich the community. To promote cultural appreciation and interfaith respect of Muslim citizens, the museum, in collaboration with Arizona State University, the City of Tempe Diversity Office and the Tempe Muslim community, will present Jewel in the Desert. This exhibit is a part of a project that is collecting life stories, oral histories and artifacts that reflect the history and experiences of Arizona Muslims. It opens October 3 in the City Hall Gallery, 31 E. Fifth Street.

This exhibit explores Cambodian, Laotian and Vietnamese refugee experiences in Tempe 30 years after the Vietnam War. Featured are oral histories, photographs and objects from these communities. Funded in part through an Arizona Humanities Council grant.

#### **Tempe Police: Their Own Story**

The Tempe Police Department has changed as Tempe has grown. See the technology changes and learn about the new roles of officers. **Richard Bauer**, Curator of Photographs and Archives, "A service that the museum now offers is the ability to do research from the convenience of your own home or office. ## **One Chapter Ends as Another Begins**

A chapter of Tempe history is drawing to an end with the closing of the Tempe Historical Society Gift Shop. Over the years, the all-volunteer run shop has raised thousands and thousands of dollars to the benefit of the museum. During this time, dozens of volunteers helped run and staff the shop, ringing sales, cleaning and dusting, taking inventory, and all the other myriad of tasks involved in running a retail establishment.

Although the Society has had a gift shop since it opened its first exhibits in the small space at the end of the old library building in 1972, its current incarnation opened for business when the expanded museum occupied the renovated library building in 1991. The shop has always been run by volunteers, and **Judy Higbee** was the first manager in the "new" shop. She was followed by **Claire Young** who managed the shop for more than 15 years, until her passing last fall. Claire brought with her a management team whose most enduring members included **Ellen Cornwell**, **Lynn Drury** and **Mary Ann Kwilosz**. Although others came and went, this core team, led by **Ellen Cornwell**, continued to work up to the very last inventory.

Thinking back about the shop brings many memories—the satellite shop in the library, the Beanie Baby frenzy of the 90s, and receiving a piece of broken merchandise as a "gift" at one of Claire's parties. Most memorable are the many volunteers who made the shop possible. Volunteers ranged in age from 13 to 90 years. **Ruth Hofmann**, who would walk from her home to the shop with the aid of a walker, and young **Eddie Diaz**, who was selected as this year's Youth Volunteer of the Year, exemplify the shop's many dedicated volunteers.

"The gift shop will always remind me of a very special time in the Society's history," remarked **Mary Ann Kwilosz**, Tempe Historical Society President. "Memories of busy, fun-filled, hectic activity, and most especially, memories of so many beautiful people--volunteers as well as customers. We've ended another Society chapter, but one that will always be close to our hearts."

The museum staff salutes the volunteers who made it all possible over the years. "Thank you," one and all. Shoppers, do not despair--the renovated museum will have a smaller gift shop adjacent to the front desk in the lobby.

## **Orbit Your Way to the Museum**

Now you can get a free ride to the museum and leave your car at home!

In 1996, Tempe voters passed a dedicated sales tax to fund transit improvements, including neighborhood circulator routes. The blue Orbit mini buses provide free service to residential areas, connecting them to local destinations such as shopping areas, other neighborhoods, major bus routes, schools and city facilities such as the Tempe Historical Museum. The Orbit buses on the Mars and Jupiter routes stop just to the west of the museum. They run every 15 minutes throughout the day. ## **Passings**

Joy W. Logan passed away on May 11. Joy was a longtime volunteer at the museum and a past member of the Tempe Historical Society. She was on the Tempe Historical Society Board in the early 1990s and served on the Historical Museum Advisory Board from 1994 to 1999. She also completed the first docent training class when the newly-remodeled museum opened in 1991 and served as a volunteer docent. She was named a museum Volunteer Emeritus for the important role she had played at the museum.

Ellen Cornwell, assistant manager of the gift shop, passed away on June 10. Always a part of the management team, Ellen worked quietly behind the scenes. She recently took over management of the shop when her long-time friend and gift shop manager Claire Young passed away. During her 15 year tenure, Ellen amassed more than 5,000 hours of service, earning her the President's Lifetime Achievement Award. In addition to her dedicated service in the gift shop, Ellen had served on the Tempe Historical Society Board since 2000 as Director, Corresponding Secretary, President, and Past President. Ellen was also the museum's Volunteer of the Year in 2000. She will be sorely missed.

## "From Baghdad with Love"

The Tempe Historical Museum, Kiwanis International Nuevo Club, and Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame are partnering for a second year to honor United States Veterans by sponsoring a special program on Friday, November 7, at the Fiesta Inn in Tempe.

The program is entitled From Baghdad with Love, after the book of the same name written by Marine Lieutenant Colonel Jay Kopelman. Lt. Col. Kopelman will relate the true story of the rescue of a puppy named Lava during the U.S.-led attack on Falluhah, Iraq, the "most dangerous city on earth." Not only do the Marines rescue Lava, but they learn unexpected lessons about life, death and war from the little refugee puppy. This story demonstrates that even in times of war there is a side to military service that has a greater cause.

Author-signed, hardback editions of From Baghdad with Love can be purchased for \$20 in advance when registering online.
