General Plan 2050 Special Election Informational Pamphlets Mailed Beginning on February 6

Publicity pamphlets providing information about the March 12, 2024 Special Election to ratify the [City of Tempe General Plan 2050](#) are being mailed to all Tempe households with a registered voter beginning on **Tuesday, February 6**. The pamphlet contains information regarding [Tempe Tomorrow – General Plan 2050](#), as well as information about early voting, voting locations, and voter identification at the polls. A sample ballot and the

arguments filed in support or opposition to the General Plan 2050 are also included in the pamphlet. As a ballot-by-mail election, all qualified voters who live within the City boundaries will be automatically mailed a ballot beginning **Wednesday, February 14**. Voters will have the option to return their ballot by mail, drop it off at a secure ballot drop box or voting location, or vote a replacement ballot in-person at a voting location. Voters can visit Locations.Maricopa.Vote to find a location near them. Voters can also sign up for ballot status alerts by texting "JOIN" to 628-683.

Two Weeks Until March 12, 2024 Election Voter Registration Deadline

The deadline to register to vote in the March 12, 2024 Primary/Special Election is just two weeks away. To be eligible to participate in the March 12 Election, Tempe residents must be registered to vote on or before midnight, **Monday, February 12**. People can register to vote or update their voter registration online at <https://servicearizona.com/VoterRegistration> or by calling the Maricopa County Elections Department at (602) 506-1511. Registered voters can visit BeBallotReady.Vote to sign into their personal voter dashboard to verify their voter registration status, check their ballot status, find important election dates, and learn more about the elections process.

SUBJECT: Tempe Works Program Update – October 2023 to December 2023

Purpose

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update to Mayor and Council regarding Tempe Works. The updates detailed below occurred from October 2023 to December 2023.

In addition, the quarterly report has been updated to include an appendix (i.e., Appendix A) that details program data from 2018 to present.

Program Highlights

- **Financial Empowerment Classes for Clients:** Tempe Works participants were offered opportunities to gain financial literacy skills through Financial Empowerment classes facilitated by Maricopa County-Arizona@Work staff. These classes show attendees how to assess necessary expenses, create a budget, and strategies to save money.
- **Care 7 Workshops for Tempe Works:** Tempe Works has partnered with Care 7 to offer free monthly workshops to participants of Tempe Community Action Agency's (TCAA) I-HELP shelter on toxic stress and trauma-informed care. The workshops allow attendees to learn about Care 7 and be connected to services needed while seeking employment through Tempe Works.
- **Mercy House Partnership:** In addition to receiving referrals for Tempe Works from HOPE, TCAA, and Care 7, Tempe Works has cultivated a new partnership with Mercy House, who manages our City's non-congregate shelter. Mercy House staff identify individuals within the shelter who are ready and willing to participate in the program.
- **Administrative Assistant Employment Opportunity:** Tempe Works has added the position of Administrative Assistant for the Administrative Support Services Division. The position is a full-time, temporary position and is available until June 2024. Duties will include routine clerical work such as filing, answering phone calls, and assisting walk-in customers.
- **Staff Training:** Tempe Works staff completed CPR & First Aid certification at the Kiwanis Recreation Center in December. Through this training staff learned proper safety protocols and techniques to better serve clients in emergency situations. Also, in November, Tempe Works staff completed introductory training to use the Homeless Information Management System (HMIS) to track participants' employment and housing statuses.

Graduates

Tempe Works has had three (3) graduates complete the program in Q2 between October 2023 and December 2023 by obtaining employment and stable housing. A total of eight graduates have graduated Tempe Works in fiscal year 2024.

Graduation is achieved in two ways. First, Tempe Works participants who are placed in a designated program position and complete 90 days of employment and become stably housed are considered a graduate of the program. Second, individuals who find employment on their own as a “self-resolve” and become stably housed through Tempe Works services are also considered graduates.

Program Participants

As of the end of December 2023, there have been 9 active program participants. Participants can either be employed 1) through Tempe Works designated positions, 2) through a partnering agency, or 3) find employment on their own.

The table below shows details of program participants from October 2023 to December 2023. During this quarter, a total of fifteen (15) individuals were active in the program. All participants received services and resources from Tempe Works staff.

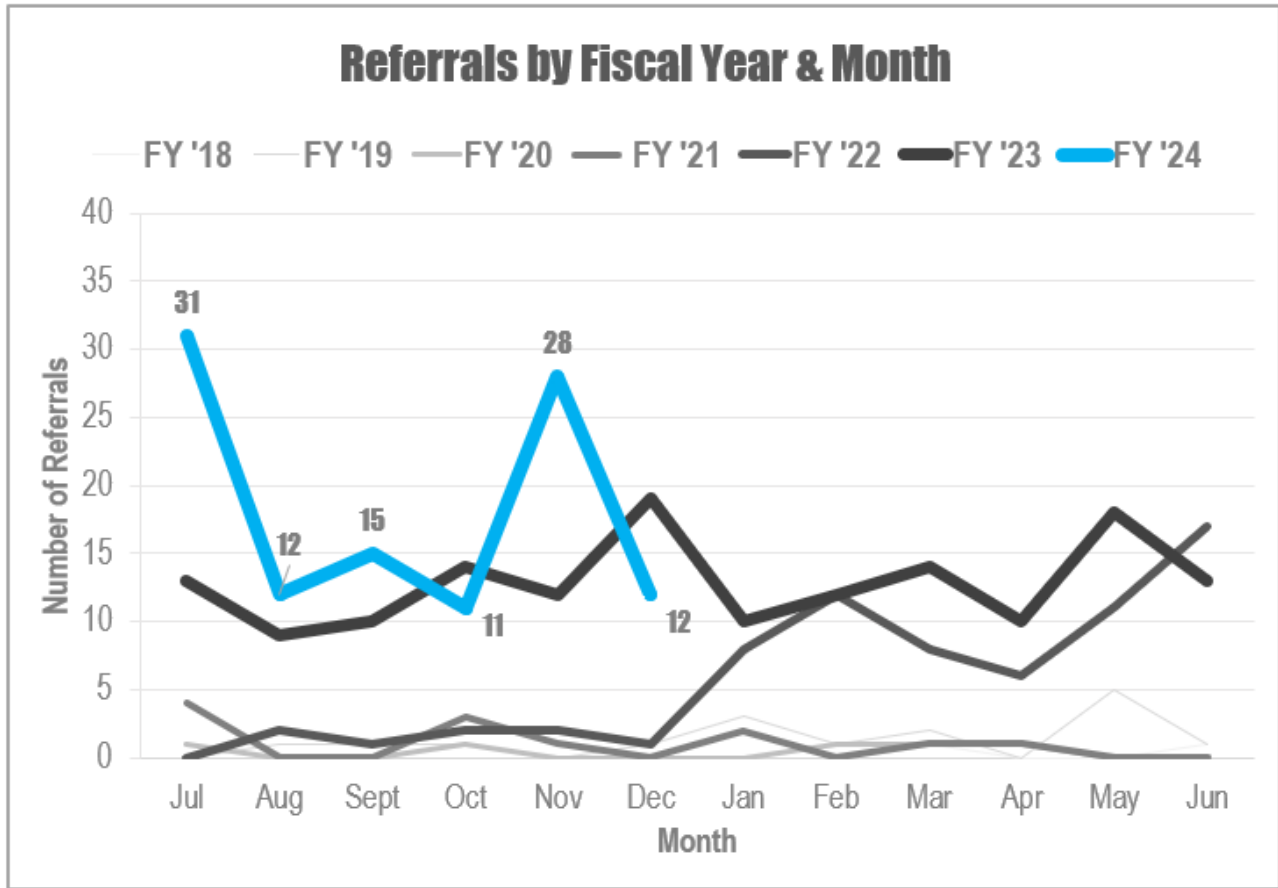

In Q2, Tempe Works has received 51 referrals from program partners such as Mercy House, HOPE, TCAA, and Care 7 between the months of October 2023 and December 2023.



In addition, Tempe Works has made numerous referrals to partnering employment agencies including Corporate Job Bank (15), and Maricopa County-Arizona@Work (8) throughout October 2023 and December 2023.

We would like to thank Aramark for partnering with Tempe Works to recruit for various positions. Tempe Works staff will focus on recruiting program participants to apply for General Utility Worker positions.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this memo is to update Mayor and Council on the creation of a subcommittee for the Parks, Recreation, Golf & Double Butte Cemetery advisory board.

CITY COUNCIL STRATEGIC PRIORITY:



3.16: Achieve ratings of “Very Satisfied” or “Satisfied” with the “Quality of City recreation, arts and cultural centers” greater than or equal to the national benchmark cities as measured in the Community Survey.

3.17: Achieve ratings of “Very Satisfied” or “Satisfied” with the “Quality of Community Services programs” greater than or equal to the top 10% of the national benchmark cities as measured in the Community Survey.

Background

In March 2023, the City entered into a thirty (30) year lease agreement with GC Rolling Hills, LLC (“Grass Clippings”) to operate, maintain, and develop the existing Rolling Hills Golf Course. The City also entered into a twenty (20) year lease agreement with Tempe Golf, LLC (CourseCo) to operate and maintain Ken McDonald Golf Course in May 2023.

Ken McDonald Golf Course will receive a renovation of the clubhouse and a new irrigation system as the City and CourseCo will partner on the projects by sharing costs on the clubhouse renovation. Grass Clippings is investing over \$13 million dollars into the Rolling Hills Golf Course and restaurant, including the newly installed lights to become the first lighted eighteen (18) hole golf course in Arizona and developed a new ninth (9th) hole green complex, to be followed by a new ninth (9th) hole tee box in addition to other property improvements.

The Parks, Recreation, Golf & Double Butte Cemetery Advisory Board (PRGDBC Advisory Board) took formal action to support both lease agreements prior to the public hearings and Council’s approval. The PRGDBC Advisory Board continues to be engaged with Grass Clippings and CourseCo, receiving quarterly updates.

Golf Subcommittee

The PRGDBC Advisory Board has a vested interest in public golf in Tempe through Tempe’s two golf courses.. The PRGDBC Advisory Board recognizes the significance and importance of the improvements at Rolling Hills and the Ken McDonald Clubhouse renovation. As such, at the January 17, 2024 PRGDBC Advisory Board meeting, the PRGDBC Advisory Board took formal action to create a subcommittee to focus on golf for up to one (1) year, which will allow members to have regular and focused time for golf discussions without impacting the time available for other future agenda items during PRGDBC Advisory Board meetings; allowing the PRGDBC Advisory Board to consider the full spectrum of opportunities in parks, recreation, golf, and the cemetery.

The purpose of the Golf subcommittee will be to assist staff as the City and Grass Clippings work towards mutual resolution of outstanding issues and to participate in the Ken McDonald clubhouse replacement preliminary design process. The PRGDBC Advisory Board will act on the recommendations provided by the subcommittee.

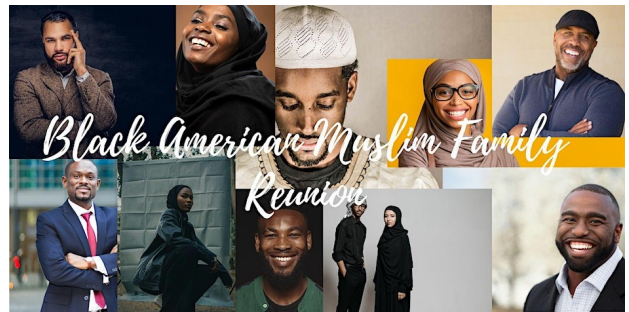
Tempe History Museum Celebrates Black History Month in February

Tempe History Museum, along with its **African American Advisory Committee** and **Muslim Advisory Committee**, offers a variety of ways to celebrate Black History through programs, events and exhibits during the month of February.

The African American Advisory Committee (AAAC) of the Tempe History Museum is a committed group of community volunteers who work to ensure that the African American history in Tempe is collected and preserved, and that the issues of importance to our community are represented. Committee members coordinate a number of events during the month of February to celebrate Black History Month. Central to the celebration is the **Faith in Action Breakfast** which unite faith and civic leaders to work toward the betterment of our community.

The [Faith In Action Breakfast](#) will kick off the festivities on Friday, February 2nd. Hosted by the museum's African American Advisory Committee, the breakfast brings together faith and civic leaders to unite for the good of our city. Guests will enjoy a full breakfast, live music by Sandra Bassett, inspirational remarks by noted speakers and the camaraderie that comes from gathering together for a common purpose.

On **Saturday, February 3rd**, continue the journey with the [Black American Muslim Family Reunion](#) hosted by the Muslim Advisory Committee and the Islamic Social Services Association, and open to everyone. From 12:30-4:00 p.m. at Tempe History Museum, explore the history and diversity of our Black American Muslim community with the goal of fostering empathy and support for one another. While visiting Tempe History Museum, take time to view the powerful artwork by **Zybrena Porter**. Zybrena creates space for honest and healthy self-expression in Black American communities by advocating for self-love and mental health. Experience healing, self-empowerment and renewal of purpose by viewing a selection of Zybrena's oil paintings, prints and displays that depict women from across the African Diaspora. Dance Tempe

On January 9th, 133 high school dance students and professional dance artists performed at the sold-out Dance Tempe event at the Tempe Center for the Arts. Special thanks to Vice Mayor Jennifer Adams, CM Berdetta Hodge and TUHSD Superintendent Dr. Stacia Wilson for giving the welcome.

In the fall, the Community Arts team launched its annual High School Dance Residency Program serving all six Tempe Union High schools. Professional dance artists selected from the Tempe area worked with each school's dance program to teach workshops to all grades and prepare choreography for advanced dance students. The residency program culminates in the Dance Tempe Showcase.

Dance students participated in all-day workshops and rehearsals before the evening performance. The performance premiered six pieces created by artists Carley Conder, Shayla Eshelman and Luis "Weezy" Egurrola during their fall 2023 residencies and featured additional pieces by each high school and the resident artists' professional companies. The program aims to create a memorable and inspiring learning experience for students while deepening the connection between aspiring young dancers, like-minded peers, and professionals. The residency also supports professional, local artists in their career by providing a platform to inspire, share, and be heard.

This program is run by Community Arts in partnership with Tempe Union High School District.
