Below are updates regarding the March 12, 2024 Primary/Special Election, for the week ending March 1, 2024.

Voters Have Until Tuesday, March 5 to Mail Back Their Ballot for the March 12 Tempe Jurisdictional Election

Tuesday, March 5 is the last recommended day for Tempe voters to mail back their completed ballot for the March 12 Jurisdictional Election. Voters may also drop off their completed ballot inside the signed and sealed envelope at any voting location or ballot drop box no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, March 12. Voters can find locations, hours, and addresses at Locations.Maricopa.Vote.

Additionally, voters may text "JOIN" to 628-683 or visit <u>BeBallotReady.Vote</u> to receive automatic notifications when their ballot is prepared, mailed, received, verified, and counted. In-person voters can also see alerts when they cast a ballot at the polls.

## In-Person Voting Location Opens Monday, March 4 for the March 12 Tempe Jurisdictional Election

Tempe voters can vote in person at the Ballot Replacement Center located at the Tempe History Museum, 809 East Southern Avenue, Tempe, AZ 85282, from Monday, March 4, through Friday March 8, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The center will also be open Tuesday, March 12 Election Day, from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voters can visit Locations.Maricopa.Vote for more information.

# Early Voting in the March 19 Presidential Preference Election

Early Voting is underway for the March 19 Presidential Preference Election (PPE). This election takes place every four years when the Office of the President of the United States is on the ballot. Only registered Republicans and Democrats can vote in the PPE. Maricopa County Elections produced this <u>video</u> to explain the different types of elections this year. The last day for a voter to request a ballot to be mailed to them for the PPE is **Friday, March 8.** Voters can make a request by visiting <u>Request.Maricopa.Vote</u>. More information about the PPE is provided on the <u>PPE page</u> on the City of Tempe's website or the <u>Frequently Asked Questions page</u> on the Maricopa County Elections website.




# Climate Justice Advisory Group (CJAG) Kick Off

The Sustainability and Resilience Office (SRO) is looking for feedback from Tempe community members on extreme heat and household energy use affordability challenges. SRO is holding a series of eight monthly bilingual workshops from February to October to invite members of the community to explore these topics. Community participants who attend the workshops will co-create the city's first Energy Equity Roadmap that will outline the direction of programs, policies, and infrastructure recommendations that will then be used to pursue funding for the community identified investments. This includes, but not limited to, looking at residential energy efficiency needs and energy cost support, urban cooling infrastructure needs such as expanding shade canopy in public and private spaces, and Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) projects.

SRO has partnered with <u>Chispa AZ</u> and <u>Rail CDC to eng</u>. Chispa AZ staff are providing content and facilitation expertise while Rail CDC is in charge of recruitment and helping develop interactive engagement strategies for the workshops. Both agencies work on sustainability efforts in the region, particularly with socio-economically and climate vulnerable populations. SRO is also including Community Health and Human Services and Tempe Community Action Agency (TCAA) staff at workshops.

The initial geographic target area for this focus group includes the neighborhoods Escalante, Victory Acres, Alegre, University Heights as well as those south of University Dr & north of Broadway between Rural Road and Price Road with an understanding that this work may engage with community members from other areas of Tempe. Reasoning behind a targeted focus is because the city's <a href="Heat Priority Scores">Heat Priority Scores</a> and energy burden data from the <a href="Low-Income Energy">Low-Income Energy</a> <a href="Affordability">Affordability (LEAD)</a> tool were used to prioritize areas of Tempe that are more susceptible to higher energy burden (the percentage of household income that goes toward energy costs) and the effects of extreme heat.

After the conclusion of the workshop series, public meetings will be held with at large Tempe residents to present and gather feedback about the proposed Energy Equity Roadmap. Feedback from the larger public meetings will be used to add to and enhance the recommended investments. After the public engagement phase, the finalized Energy Equity Roadmap, including findings and recommendations, will be presented to City Council.

#### Tempe Diablo Stadium Recycling and Composting During Spring Training Baseball

Keep Tempe Beautiful (KTB), GreenLight Solutions, the Sustainability and Resilience Office (SRO) and the Community Services Department are spearheading food composting and extensive recycling efforts at all 16 spring training games this year. Additional partners include Legends (merchandising and concessions), Plan B Facility Services (custodial) and the Solid Waste Services Section of the Tempe Municipal Utilities Department.

KTB donated \$5,000 to pay for GreenLight Solutions staff to oversee sorting efforts and manage volunteers before, during and after each game and to cover the cost to compost food scraps and paper products via a local composting service, R. City. An SRO staff member, who has worked with the Diablo Stadium Manager, Legends Director and GreenLight Solutions Executive Director for months to plan for enhanced diversion efforts this season, will also work several games.

At least 20 volunteers and one to three Greenlight Solutions staff members will be on-site at all sixteen games. Volunteers and staff will monitor trash and recycling containers in the concourse, lawn seating and at all three entrances. A sorting table and staging area near the trash and recycling roll-offs will enable volunteers and staff to easily remove remaining recyclable and compostable items. Each food vendor and concession area will place food scraps and compostable paper products in five-gallon buckets that will be serviced during and after each game. Volunteers and staff will also walk the stands and lawn area after each game to recycle and compost as much as possible.



# **Keep Tempe Beautiful (KTB)**

KTB is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization focused on the beautification and sustainability of Tempe. The four initiatives to reach that goal are tree plantings, recycling with the City of Tempe, community gardens and park, street, and alley cleanups. KTB has removed over 15,600 pounds of litter from City of Tempe parks and streets, diverting over 1,900 pounds of recyclables and over 2,200 pounds of green organics. In addition, they have planted over 200 trees and engaged 5,295 volunteers for a total of 7,388 volunteer hours.

#### **GreenLight Solutions**

GreenLight Solutions is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to educating and empowering the next generation of sustainability leaders by helping students launch sustainability careers and assist

businesses in going green. Since 2022, GreenLight Solutions Green Events Services Division has diverted several tons of material from the landfill at events including Oktoberfest, Tour de Fat and the Mesa Marathon.

## R. City

R. City is a local organization that picks up food scraps and compostable service ware from residential and commercial customers and composts these items on their farm in south Phoenix. The finished compost is used to grow produce, which is available for purchase, thus serving as an example of a local circular economy program in action.

# PUBLIC ART UPDATE: MILL AVENUE UNDERPASS ARTWORK

In 2023, Tempe Arts & Culture commissioned artists Creative Machines to develop Public Art at the Mill Avenue Underpass, located adjacent to Tempe High School. This proximity to the school provided an ideal opportunity to align educational opportunities with Arts & Culture's mission to enhance art and cultural awareness throughout the City.

The Public Art and Community Art staff worked with the school's art teachers and assistant principal to arrange for Creative Machines to speak with approximately 300 students in group sessions throughout the day on Monday, February 26<sup>th</sup>. Creative Machines shared their studio practice and provided students with insights to the development process of the artwork planned for the Mill Avenue Underpass. Students gained real-world experience seeing art through the lens of professionals collaborating in art and engineering and learned more about career development opportunities in STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math).

# **ART TEMPE RECEPTION**

On February 27, approximately 250 students, teachers, families and community members came together for the 51st annual Art Tempe reception held at Tempe Center for the Arts. The well-attended event celebrated the top efforts of 109 student artists and dedicated faculty across the Tempe Union High School District (TUHSD) fine arts programs at Corona del Sol, Desert Vista, Marcos de Niza, McClintock, Mountain Pointe and Tempe high schools.

This year piloted a special school residency program designed to connect local students with professional artists to educate, inspire and mentor their artistic development. Two outstanding artists from the "Storytellers" exhibition at the Gallery at TCA - Wabwila Mugala and Jan Talmadge Davids - visited participating high schools to talk about their art careers and creative processes, as well as lead a workshop with advanced level classes.



Special thanks to Vice Mayor Jennifer Adams, Councilmember Berdetta Hodge and TUHSD Superintendent Dr. Stacia Wilson for giving the welcome. The exhibition includes a variety of media including painting, drawing and ceramics, and will be on view in the Lakeside Room at Tempe Center for the Arts from Feb. 23-March 5. Admission is free.
