The Holdeman Neighborhood Association seeks to complete an Adaptive Streets pavement painting project in the bike lanes on Hardy Dr between 16th and 19th Streets. The purpose of the project on Hardy is to highlight the bike lane and cyclists' presence on the road, and prompt road users to slow down and take caution. Hardy Dr is also one of the bounding streets of Holdeman, so this pavement mural painting will serve a placemaking and beautifying function, welcoming people to the neighborhood.

Our proposed adaptive streets pavement painting project draws on a well-established precedent within Tempe, similar to the recent bike lane painting along College Ave in the Broadmor Neighborhood, whose NA we are actively engaged with to leverage their valuable insights from the completion of that project. Our Vice Chair brings experience in executing neighborhood grant projects, and we have a strong base of local volunteers eager to participate in the painting should we be funded. Additionally, we have access to a talented pool of local artists, seven of which have responded to our request for bids, experienced in both neighborhood grants and adaptive streets projects, who are also available for ongoing maintenance and touch-ups. This combination of experience, community engagement, and local expertise positions us strongly to successfully

The Holdeman Neighborhood Association, inspired by the success and community-building effects seen in other local projects, recently reconvened to brainstorm potential initiatives for a neighborhood grant. A meeting was called via a postcard invitation to all neighbors, and during our April 2024 gathering, unanimous support emerged for an Adaptive Streets pavement painting project in the bike lanes, mirroring the successful implementation on College Ave.

This project was chosen in response to the concerns over the fast-moving and high-volume traffic on Hardy Dr, a key route for cyclists and micromobility users, including the popular Handlebars BIKEIT path. The community felt a strong need to signal to drivers that they are entering a shared space, encouraging them to slow down and exercise caution. Additionally, there has been ongoing discussion about enhancing the aesthetic appeal of Hardy Dr south of 16th St, where the road widens and lacks significant greenery. This pavement mural project will not only beautify the area but also strengthen its identity as a welcoming, communal space.

Moreover, this initiative offers a unique opportunity for neighbors to engage directly in the transformation of their environment. Residents will have the chance to contribute to the design process alongside the artist and participate in the actual painting, further fostering neighborhood connections and pride.





Artist Statement

Kyllan Maney's work is rooted in the interactive process between the viewer and her work. She enjoys the inventive and creative process of discovering transcendence in patterns and forms found in nature. Radial patterns are a common theme in Kyllan's work, these pieces are considered by her as centering mediational moments.

Kyllan shows her work across the valley in various galleries. She has created numerous commercial and residential murals including for Scottsdale Public Art, MonOrchid, Downtown Phoenix, Intel, Paypal, The Dhaba, Mesa Public Library and Roche Diagnostics. She also was the recipient of the 2021 Influx commission for the City of Tempe where she created art for banners on the outside of the Edna Vihil building. Kyllan has recently been a part of the City of Tempe introduction phase to the adaptive street program, she has pioneered the materials and the process for painting these murals on the streets of Tempe. She was recently interviewed by KJZZ's Made in Arizona where she discussed her newest mural on Mill Avenue in Tempe. Kyllan loves creating interactive community collective installations and interactive art throughout the year. Some of these projects include Canal Convergence, Desert Glow at the Desert Botanical Garden and Spark! events at Mesa Arts Center. As a teaching artist, Kyllan shares her art knowledge as an Instructor and is the Visual Arts Coordinator at New School for the Arts and Academics.

Mural Process and Timeline

Longevity of the mural will depend on the amount of traffic on the streets and weather conditions. Mural will naturally fade with dirt and tire debris over time. When mural has faded it can be repainted with touch up paint or another mural can be created.

Thank you for inviting me to participate and quote on this project! As an avid cyclist, I would love to be involved in this project. I have done two Adaptive Street murals in Tempe and have really enjoyed the process and I am a big believer in the concept. I have also done a lot of work with the local cycling club in my hometown, Chico, California. I recently collaborated with a sculptor and fabricator to create a large, steel gate that closes a popular hill-climb to cars, so cyclists can ride without the risk of vehicular traffic!

Dear Neighbors,

Thank you for inviting me to submit a proposal for artistic enhancements in your neighborhood.

For two decades, I have created public art in various mediums and led community art workshops. My projects have included multimedia mosaics; painted metal; wood; ceramics; glass tile; photographs on porcelain-enameled steel, tile, and dyed aluminum; Morse Code; poetry; and water features. I am skilled at working with a wide variety of materials and am looking forward to street painting. When choosing materials, I consider durability, Arizona's weather conditions, low maintenance, and cost to deliver the best value for the money.

As a 40-year resident of Tempe, first in the Wilson Art and Garden neighborhood and currently in the Broadmor neighborhood, I am aware of the traffic issues facing our neighborhood streets. I love the idea of using art to slow traffic and encourage drivers and cyclists to take a pause.

As a lifelong gardener, many of my projects include botanical elements. While I always develop projects based on neighborhood feedback, I am submitting two images of my past projects and an illustration of one idea that shows a way I could approach your project.

In the attached illustration, I have approached your project thinking of bright colors of neighborhood grass and irrigation combined with abstracted shapes of desert plants. My goal is for the abstracted botanical imagery to be viewed and enjoyed from any direction. In addition to the street painting, I am including a visual showing the idea of a vertical element (think Peace Pole) that could extend the impact of the art and further meet your goals of slowing traffic. A simple painted column could be embellished with phrases of kindness, friendship, and peace that could be developed with neighbors and Holdeman students.

The visuals I am submitting represent initial ideas. If selected as your project artist, I would further develop the art concepts based on neighbor feedback. Visuals and an itemized budget for each proposal are attached.

My art-making process begins with sketches that offer art concepts for neighborhood review so the final designs include your input and ideas. Neighbors meet, look at initial sketches and materials and suggest ideas. After I gather input from neighbors, I develop the project in my studio, and then schedule times that neighbors and students would have an opportunity to be involved in the making of the art (if there is interest).

I'm excited to use my skills and experience to create beauty in your neighborhood. Thank you for considering me to be your project artist.



- Meeting with the community to finalize design. After community input is received, I will deliver a sketch including necessary revisions **2 weeks**
- Ground mural installation planning. We will need to coordinate a meeting with community leaders who will help supervise the volunteer effort and Southwest Barricades. An action plan will then be created. **1 month**
- Community outreach for paint-by-number volunteers **1 month**
- Community paint days will be done with the paint-by-numbers method. Artist will be responsible for creating the paint-by-number design and will be responsible for providing "touch ups" **2 days**
