Upon the establishment of a quorum, meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Elizabeth Hatch.

Agenda Item 1 – Public Appearances

None.

Agenda Item 2 – Approval of Meeting Minutes

August 21, 2024

Motion by Lane Waddell to approve the meeting minutes of August 21, 2024. Seconded by Mary Farmer. Motion passed on a 7-0 vote.

Ayes: Vice Chair Elizabeth Hatch, board members Mary Farmer, Thomas Klabunde, Shereen Lerner, Gerardo Lopez, Cory Pechtl, and Lane Waddell.

Absent: Susan Carlson, Shereen Lerner, Regina Ponder, and Lisa Zyriek. Shereen and Lisa arrived after the vote.

Agenda Item 8 - Desert Conservation Commission Update

Elizabeth Hatch moved up Agenda Item 8. Shereen provided an updated on the Desert Conservation Commission.

- Management plan currently being reviewed before going out for public meetings; final draft is likely in January, public outreach in October
- Preserve is approximately 300 acres
- Hayden Butte management plan previously completed will be combined with this plan
- Money identified in 5-year CIP plan; CIP funding for park improvements is tied to bond election, if does not pass then money would need to come from elsewhere
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - o How many acres is the preserve?
 - o Is there a timeline for completing the plan?
 - o Is there money to implement?

Agenda Item 3 - Girl Scouts Troop 203 Buddy Bench

Shawn Wagner informed board of Buddy Bench community project by local Girl Scouts Troop 203.

- Bench is available for someone who wants to sit and be able to talk to someone; placed at Escalante Multi-Gen Center and only one currently known to exist in City
- Supplies donated by local hardware stores, wood from Urban Forestry
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - Do Buddy Benches exist anywhere else?

Agenda Item 4 - Golf

Lane Waddell informed the board that there were no updates from the subcommittee.

Agenda Item 5 - Heat Relief Efforts - Community Health & Human Services

Jessica Wright presented on Heat Relief efforts locally in Tempe and regionally.

- Heat relief efforts officially run May September 30; seen increase in heat-related deaths in Maricopa County; heat relief deaths this season has surpassed previous numbers
- Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) provides map of available resources; 6 City Cooling Centers, Jenny's Trailer provides mobile heat relief
- Partnered with Department of Public Health for funding, Arizona Faith Network offered daily operations; three church locations; funding for three years; additional heat relief locations that coordinate directly with MAG
- Worked with Lyft and 211 to provide free rides to cooling centers, HOPE also transported
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - Are efforts working? Were there fewer deaths this year?

Agenda Item 6 - Urban Forest Update

Richard Adkins provided an update on Urban Forestry.

- Responsibility for trees depends on where in City, HOAs, commercial property boundaries
- Summer maintenance, clean-up, prevention pruning; August heat hit a lot of trees hard
- Urban Wood Program; 3 benches milled, built and installed in Sister Cities courtyard at Library
- 425 trees last season, October to May; 53 cost match trees, 11 living tree memorials
- Cost Match Program: application, City pays 50% of tree cost, staff delivers, will not plant
- Some trees from City Hall will be milled, repurposed
- Growing Together Program that was grant-funded starts end of September
- Rain to Roots; recommendations for Code and policy changes, public input
- New maps coming: canopy map in December, engineered shade maps, community tree maps that will include submissions by community available October 7; URL will be provided to public to connect to survey to provide information; public communication releases, social media
- New development plans will be required to provide information on trees and engineered shade
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - o Who is responsible for trees that have died between wall and street?
 - o Can you explain Development Review Commission's new requirement for trees, shade
 - o What is Cost Match Program?
 - o What will happen to trees being taken down at City Hall?
 - o How does community participate in Community Tree map? How will they know?

Agenda Item 7 - Adaptive Recreation, Escalante, and Community Gardens

Erin Kirkpatrick provided an overview of her workgroup that she supervises in Recreation.

- Adaptive Recreation supports youth and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities;
 housed at Westside Multi-Gen but programs also offered at locations throughout City
- Currently IBCCES Certified Autism Center, working toward Autism City certification
- Three community gardens on public property; each different offerings, all open to public; currently no plans for more community gardens
- Escalante has grown in services offered over years, bulk of memberships and participations is from surrounding neighborhoods; programs are free or low cost
- Adaptive, Gardens, and Escalante work with a lot of community partners; Escalante houses
 offices for Tempe Community Action Agency, Maricopa County Youth Workforce Development
- Youth Membership is free; after-school program, Kinder Kids, teen drop-in activities
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - o Are there plans for more community gardens?

Agenda Item 9 - Board Operational Updates

Alex Jovanovic discussed with the board the current status of the discussion about a memorial donation policy.

- Goals
- Next Steps
- Opportunities

- Alex asked if the board wants to continue pursuing a memorial policy
- Parks does not receive many memorial policy requests, but has been asked about a policy before; some people have installed their own memorials in parks without permission
- A model similar to a suicide awareness bench could be considered and included in CIP project
- Living Tree Memorial and memorial plagues at Pyle are current memorial program options
- Previously board expressed desire to get involved in helping with policy; will look to add memorial policy discussion as future agenda item
- Advocacy statement draft discussed at previous meeting will be revisited at upcoming meeting
- Board members asked questions and made comments about:
 - I think it's more up to the City whether or not there should be a policy
 - Do you get asked as to why there is not a policy?
 - o If we thought it was a good idea to have a suicide awareness bench installed there's no way it could be done currently?
 - o There is currently a memorial policy for planting a tree?
 - o Do you want a process created by the board?
 - Send advocacy statement along with next meeting's documents
 - Wants board to consider having a vote on whether or not to have a memorial policy;
 likes board having a role in assisting with developing policy; why not have something if
 it's reasonable instead of turning people away
