
Scudder Park Improvements 1st Meeting Survey Results

1. Of the five Scudder Park playground area layouts, which do you prefer (The budget is the same for all layouts)?

2. Why did you choose this option?

Layout A:

- 1. Do not disturb existing trees.
- 2. Shade structures. Save as many trees as possible + more trees. Wheelchair accessible.
- 3. I picked A because it is most likely to save the tree.

Layout B:

- 1. Looks to be a larger layout and more efficient use of the land.
- 2. Option B enlarges the playground area without a concrete division. Option D is a close second, with an appealing design.
- 3. Looks like the most play area
- 4. Looks like it would provide the largest amount of space for the actual play area
- 5. spreads out play area more and looks as if it is bigger square footage than current footprint
- 6. It adds the most space between the playground equipment for the different age groups. The accessibility path is best not cutting directly through the play area. Rather than this small neighborhood park, I think Kiwanis Park is best suited for something like a pickleball court.
- 7. Good design to increase the length of the playground.
- 8. I like that the area is larger than the old park. It will give more room for kids to run around and play in while providing a sitting area for the parents.

Layout C:










4. A new red double slide was installed in 2012. Do you want to include the slide in the new playground design?

6. Additional comments

- 1. Please save the existing large trees.
- 2. Keep as many trees as possible. Please add more trees, if possible. Thank you.
- 3. A cluster of picnic tables is a priority for family gatherings, birthday parties, etc. Spring Rider Animal equipment should be installed side-by-side. Kids pretend to race. Shade is very important. Mature trees are preferred.
- 4. Many people also use the grass area for soccer and other games. Please leave an open area for this. Thanks. Looking forward to the changes!
- 5. It is important that the park is accessible for toddlers because.
- 6. Shade is very important and a major attraction for our kids and their safety. The Park should accommodate children from 2 and up, not just 5 and up.
- 7. Would love a splash pad or some kind of water feature. would like to know how the park will also be maintained as the current as lacked proper maintenance (i.e. low sand levels)

- 9. This is an important park renovation for our community. We have 3 kids and have lived in this neighborhood for 10 years. To continue the growth of young families in this neighborhood, we need to have amenities like this park renovation.
- 10. Don't get rid of the 2012 slide. Maybe move it, but it is still a good slide. I don't really care about the theme. I live just down the street from the park and my family (3 kids) use the current park quite a bit. Looking at other Tempe parks it is sorely in need of a re-do.
- 11. I think it is very important to have 2 separate areas for the toddlers/young children and the more active older children. Unfortunately it seems as though the ramadas are off the table, however it is important to have shaded tables/benches in which to hang out with the kids at the park, when planning placement of benches please keep that in mind no need for anything too fancy just updated and new equipment that is where the money should go for the kids play area. That is what started the neighborhood planning process. I would love to have a second round of comments with the short list of what the neighborhood wanted and then do a second round of "voting". We can write neighborhood grants for shade structures to be added later please put the money into the equipment and layout and then we can cover later.
- 12. A couple of regular park benches placed under the shade trees around the north end of the park would be nice for neighbors to enjoy the park, especially for those who are not walking dogs, watching children play or having a picnic.
- 13. Red slide should remain. Add lighting to playground and @ each picnic table area. Add water fountain to playground. Create fire-pit on north side of park to encourage family and friends to come out in the evenings.
- 14. I think it would be nice to include multiple game tables instead of just one so that more than just one group of friend would be able to use them, this also applies to he shade structures.
- 15. It would be fun to have an original teeter totter that you sit on.
- 16. Please try to preserve as many trees as possible.
- 17. Eliminate picnic benches, tables and grills, never used. Plant a mix of many shade trees to create a woodlot appearance with shaded benches and paver trail around perimeter. Maintain flood irrigation to preserve healthy trees.
- 18. Save the trees.
