PROJECT NARRATIVE

In the space provided below, please describe specifically how the City of Tempe's funds will be used:

The City of Tempe funds will be used to compensate the artist for the design, preparation, creation, transportation, collaborative process, taxes, insurance, and installation of art work in the median south of the intersection of Southern Ave. and Hardy Dr. [Attachment 6]

The neighborhood and neighboring HOA voted on "Cotton Clouds" by Lucy Erb as their favorite design. Depending on the cost of materials, transportation, etc. the design will be modified to fit the budget of \$10,000. For example, Lucy has already determined through discussions with Greg Brockman of Magnum Companies (Magnum Engineering, Inc.), that her original design must be modified to consist of one sculpture in one median, as opposed to two sculptures in both medians as originally envisioned. Additionally, other modifications may be mad depending on budget. For example, if the budget permits, instead of the "clouds" consisting of curved 2-dimensional pieces of metal, the "clouds" could be made of 3-dimensional bulbous shapes.

- 1. Please describe how this project meets each of the guidelines listed:
 - A. Improves health and safety of residents:

N/A

B. Benefits a significant number of residents and/or the City at large:

This public art piece will benefit many people: the residents of the Southern Palms Neighborhood Association, the residents of the Southern Village Estates HOA, and the City at large via individuals who travel on Hardy Drive and individuals who use the public transit stop at Hardy and Southern.

C. Addresses a known neighborhood deficiency:

As a "new" re-activated neighborhood association, our neighborhood lacks a sense of community identity and knowledge of our history. From what we have gleaned from original and long-time residents, our neighborhood used to be cotton fields. The chosen art piece will foster a sense of neighborhood identity and harken back to our neighborhood's history when we were cotton fields.

D. Complements other neighborhood projects (private or City):

The public artwork will build on other public art pieces in the surrounding area, such as Melissa Martinez's Streetscaping Project on Hardy Dr.

E. Provides an environmental benefit, such as water and/or energy conservation:

Depending on the time of day, the public artwork would provide some additional shade for pedestrians using that median as a crosswalk.

F. Enhances the aesthetics of the neighborhood:

The artwork at Hardy Dr. and Southern Ave. will be aesthetically pleasing. The metals used to form the artwork will add light and contrast to that median. Additionally, the shapes cut out of the metal will cast interesting shadows on the sidewalk below that will change as the day progresses and the sun moves through the sky.

G. Accessible to all members of the community:

The potential location for the artwork (south of the intersection of Southern Ave. and Hardy Dr.) is extremely accessible to members of the community because it sits on a road where almost all residents of the community travel through on a daily basis. Since our neighborhood spans from east to west of Hardy Dr., it was important for us to select a potential location that would enhance aesthetics for residents living on both sides of Hardy Dr.

2. Describe how members of the community have been directly involved in the development of the project.

The artwork project was the brainchild of one of our neighbors, Susan Bendix. From our very first official meeting as a neighborhood, when we elected our officers, the neighbors began to informally discuss ideas they would like for the grant proposal, as documented in our minutes [Attachment 1]. Multiple emails, mailers, Facebook posts, and website posts encouraged neighbors to research and present ideas for the grant proposal [Attachment 2]. In February 2016, the neighborhood met to vote on which idea would be the subject of our grant proposal [Attachment 3]. Susan's idea for public art was presented and was the neighborhood's favorite idea. From that point, Mia, the Southern Palms NA President, and other neighbors worked together to take photographs, measurements, and speak to City officials in order to publish the neighborhood's "Call to Artists." Subsequently, the neighborhood held another meeting in March 2016 to view artist designs, ask questions of the artists, and vote on favorite designs [Attachment 3]; [Artist Submissions, Attachments 4 and 5]. The voting and designs were also available online and we received the majority of votes through email and comments on the website. Our neighbors and the neighboring HOA ultimately voted on "Cotton Clouds" by Lucy Erb as the favorite art design.

3. Grant funds can only be used for the capital improvement project, not maintenance. Please describe specifically how the association intends to maintain the project if funded.

The designs submitted for the artwork took into consideration maintenance. The artist chose uncolored metal to reduce any need for maintenance. For all intents and purposes, the artwork will not require maintenance. In the event that maintenance is required, the neighborhood will organize an event to maintain the artwork (*e.g.*, cleaning). However, if any potential maintenance issues arise that require professional services, the neighborhood will raise funds through individual donations.

4. If your association has previously received grant funds, please share how they have impacted your neighborhood.

To our knowledge, the Southern Palms NA has not previously received grant funds.

5. Outside of grant projects, please describe any other activities your association has participated in (i.e. GAIN, Adopt-A-Park, food drives, etc.) within the past year.

Our neighborhood reactivated in May 2015. Since then, we hosted a GAIN party/potluck in Dwight Park. We also organized a community yard sale in October 2015 with multiple households participating. One of our neighbors also led a project for a public mural in Dwight Park. Our neighbors collectively donated over \$500 to fund the cost of paint, supplies, and professional pressure washing. The labor and design are donated by neighbors. All of the neighbors were given the opportunity to vote on 1 of 3 designs, which were posted on our website. That project is currently ongoing. The wall for the mural has already been washed and neighborhood volunteers applied primer. The actual painting is set to begin within the next few days.



I. Grant Proposal Vote




Samples of Metals to be Used in Lucy Erb's Artwork

LETTER OF INTENT

Over the last couple years I have gained a large interest in public art. I hope to create an inspirational experience that people of all ages and backgrounds can enjoy. I believe art can have a powerful impact on everyone, so bringing communities together through sculpture in public spaces is important to me. One of the things that I have done to help my pieces become a point of pride for a community is to make each piece site specific and play off the history and aspects of the of the site that make that location unique.



Cotton Clouds





In the blistering summer as we stand in 117 degrees we would give anything to even think about the cool waters of the ocean. It seems so far away, yet it may not be as far as you think.
