Agenda Item 1 – Public Appearance

Vice Chair Jung asked for members of the public to introduce themselves.

Agenda Item 2 – Approval of Meeting Minutes

Agenda Item 3 – Recap Previous Presentations

Eric Iwersen, Principal Planner, recapped last meeting's 5th Street presentation. This concept reflects the collective feedback from the different Boards and Commissions sharing responsibility, the Sustainability Commission and the Transportation Commission. He explained the project funding step, if approved.

They will present to the City Council the preferred concept on April 6th.

Agenda Item 4 – Streetcar

Eric Iwersen, Principal Planner, gave an overview presentation of the Streetcar Project. It is part of the regional Valley Metro transportation system.

Discussion about:

- Wireless option/propulsion four difference scenarios
- Different funding sources /President budget
- It is an urban circulator that will cover three miles route, six vehicles (four operating) and 14 stops have been identified.
- Intersection Ash and 1st Street on April 17th street design feedback

Agenda Item 5 – Highline Canal Multi-use Path Project Presentation

Robert Yabes, Principal Planner, gave an update on the Highline Canal Multi-use Path project along with final design concept. The path is located in the west central and south Tempe extending from Baseline Road to Knox Road for approximately four miles.

The project links directly to Phoenix, Guadalupe and Chandler and connects a diversity of neighborhoods to employment centers, parks, schools and commercial areas. The project will include lighting, landscaping, street crossings, public art and other path amenities. Project construction is estimated to start late 2017 or early 2018

Chair Kane appointed Vice Chair Jung to represent the Sustainability Commission to be part of the selection committee for the Highland Canal art installation.

Agenda Item 6 – Tempe Sustainability Award

The Sustainability Commission selected the Meiny Vermaas as the residential winner project for the 2017 Tempe Sustainability Award, and Singh Meadow, as the commercial winner project for the 2017 Tempe Sustainability Award.

Braden Kay and Carla Sidi will finalize the award prize and presentation. Commissioners Monty and Hu will work on the wording ceremony.

A motion was made to approve the awards.

Agenda Item 7 – Urban Forest

Bonnie Richardson, Principal Planner, gave an update on Urban Forest project. The goal of the Urban Forest Master plan is to expand Tempe's urban forest tree canopy and all the benefits trees provide. Discussion about:

- City-wide goal of 25% tree and shade canopy through three key public spaces on which to focus the planting and maintenance of new trees over this time: parks and open spaces, streets and urban hubs that are cores of commercial and civic activity that supports the 20-minute city
- Reduce heat island canopy over flood irrigate areas
- Private/Public Engagement Education, Implementation and collaboration
- Partnership with Duke University, ASU, and Urban Offsets as an initiative that will add trees to our parks and improve air quality in our neighborhoods.
- Tree in the right-of-way in parks. Around 150 trees will be planted in parks in 2017 as the initial phase of this collaboration. If successful, we anticipate continuing the program in future years.
- There are approximately 19,450 city-managed trees in Tempe. Challenges to maintaining the existing canopy and expanding the urban forest include water use, pruning, infrastructure coordination, and funding.

Braden Kay, Sustainability Manager, reminded the Commission that the Sustainability Award will be presented at the State of Neighborhoods on April 22nd. The event is from 8-11am at the Tempe History Museum.
