We are looking to utilize the funds from the grant program to continue to improve and beautify our neighborhood park. Optimist Park serves as the focal point and center of our community, connecting four neighborhood quadrants and serving as an amenity to over 1700+ homes/families.

With the grant funds we would seek to add 35 new trees to our park, enhancing a shaded perimeter and walkway along our park pathways. We are also seeking the funds needed to replace older park picnic tables and grills as well as install additional dog waste receptacles and a new bike rack in the park.

The last item, we hope to commemorate one of our trees in the park to the loss of one our Optimist Park family members who fell victim to a senseless crime and tragedy. Her memory and love for our park, her park, will forever be inscribed into a memorial placard in our park.

Narrative:

We are looking to utilize the funds from the grant program to continue to improve and beautify our park. Optimist Park is the focal point and center of our community, connecting 4 neighborhood quadrants and serving as an amenity to over 1700+ homes/families.

In Optimist Park Neighborhood our quadrants work together. We take pride in the quality and caliber of our park and continue to seek ways to beautify and enhance the area we live in. Currently the Tempe Public Works Parks Plan, has the addition of light fixtures near our playground slotted for this year, after which there is no specified improvements or development found for Optimist Park through the end of 2021(See Attached). With the grant funds we would seek to add 35 new trees to our park enhancing a shaded perimeter and walkway along our park pathways. The installment of these trees (15 Chinese Elm, 10 Arizona Ash, 10 Modesto Ash) provide a multitude of benefits to our residents, the City, and values of the area. It meets the criteria of the grant in many ways, but also highlights our Neighbor's commitment to Tempe's Urban Forestry Master Plan.

City of Tempe has the goal of becoming a 20 minute City by 2040. The placement of the trees is strategic in that it shades perimeter and interior walkways most used in the park and also highlights the connecting corridor of land between the El Paso Bike Path. The request for the grant funds to add these trees is also reflective of how Tempe empowers residents to develop and increase the tree canopy within our City. It expands the shade of the park offering more residents a cooler alternative when walking. The trees selected offer biodiversity and additional habitat to our park. We hope to plant diverse species of trees that absorb potential shocks, including extreme heat and species-specific disease. Developing a healthy urban forest that provides natural habitat for birds, animals and pollinators. Pollinators are often attracted to specific native species. For example, over 60 pollinators are attracted to the native mesquites, but only 12 come to the South American Mesquite. Additionally, migrating song birds that pass through Arizona prefer native trees and provide residents with pest control, beauty and song. Birds also enhance tourism in the Valley, attracting birders from across the world. This principle aligns with the City's habitat management plans to establish and manage natural wetlands and to provide habitat diverse species of plants, trees, animals and pollinators.

We have selected these trees that reduce the need/use for water and fertilizers. The trees are all located where they will have access to drip systems maximizing water efficiency.

We are looking to add 3 new dog waste receptacles to the north side of Optimist Park and near the west entrance to the El Paso Gas Bike Path. We have many responsible pet owners in our park and the installment of the additional waste bins offers an amenity and convenience to our neighbors in the North, who have previously had to walk to the south end for dog waste bags.

Several of the items on our grant are to replace current and existing amenities at our park. We have 3 small picnic tables and 1 large picnic table, as well as a grill, and 8 "doldrum" style trash

bins in need of replacement. We have worked with Parks and Rec department to ensure that the replacements will match our benches and other more recent enhancements. One of the goals is to install/use a bicycle rack, placed near the entrance of the playground located on the south side of the park. In 2015, the League of American Bicyclists re-designated Tempe a Gold-Level Bicycle Friendly Community Award winner. With almost 4% of Tempe residents biking to work, Tempe has one of the highest bicycle commuters in the country. Tempe uses the best methods for integrating bicycling and bicycle infrastructure into all levels of city planning. The City's urban design plans include accommodations for bicycling in order to integrate bicycling as a part of the culture of Tempe and to assist in the enhancement of a balanced transportation system. We're proud to live in a city that is one of the leading bicycle communities in the country and want to include this additional to our park to encourage residents to bike to the park.

Through these enhancements and additions to the park we enhance property values of our home, our community and the city. The enhanced areas and property values and attract businesses, retail customers and residents. Increased property values benefit homeowners at resale. Livability in the desert demands shade during months of extreme heat.

Through enhancing our park we are providing an environmental benefit to our neighbors, the residents of Tempe and the City. The enhancements are in the focal point of our community, in the park, and are accessible to all members of the community. The improvements enhance the health and safety of the community and invite residents to gather and get active in the park. The enhancements are also going to increase the canopy within our park offering additional shade and amenities to residents. The natural beauty of a green, tree-lined street or park encourages outdoor activities, supporting stress reduction, regular exercise and a healthy lifestyle. As noted above, these park improvements enhance and complement other City initiatives (Urban Forestry Plan, Transportation Master Plan, Capital improvements Plan Parks Initiative- attached) and enhance what little improvements were budgeted for our park through resident initiated action. The benefit of the plans for our grant is that there is minimal maintenance and upkeep after the installation of the proposed improvement. Possibly one of the best and most meaningful items in the grant is a beautiful tribute to one of our Optimist Neighbors who taken from us far too soon. This item of the grant passed unanimously when voted upon and offers a small and meaningful tribute to the memory of who fell victim tragically to a senseless act of crime. Optimist Park was one of her favorite places to enjoy her childhood and seemed only fitting that we would dedicate a tree who has served our community and neighborhood for over 10 years.

All pricing is conducive and reviewed through Parks and Recreation Department Dave McClure.


Additional Information:



The bike rack loops cost \$345 each that includes installation. To add the concrete pad under for up to 5 loops would cost \$540 added to \$1,725 for the five loops =\$2,265
The 4'x4' concrete pad for trash receptacles would cost \$144 per each area. Please let me know if you need anything else.
