Current Challenge

Research shows that children who are physically fit and consistently active are more likely to perform better and be more engaged within the classroom. Students who obtain the level of recommended per day physical activity tend to benefit from improved cognitive performance, as well as exhibit an increase in positive mood and behavior.

The Arizona Department of Health Services created EMPOWER Standards for healthier schools and communities that focus on three main goals: to keep children moving through at least 60 minutes of physical activity per day; limit non-educational screen time to fewer than three hours per week; and keep sedentary activities to a minimum of 60 minutes at a time.

Studies show that only one in four youth participate in the recommended 60 minutes of physical activity per day. This has resulted in an increase in unhealthy habits for children, such as poor nutrition, cognitive dysfunction, increased toxic stress and lack of social connections. Part of the cure for these ailments revolves around play. Just as a healthy diet balances proteins, fats, carbohydrates and other nutrients, a balanced play diet should include a mix of structured and unstructured activities. Play helps support the healthy development of collaboration, creativity, problem-solving, resilience and empathy.

Additional research conducted by the Arizona After 3PM Afterschool Alliance (2014) indicates that there are a substantial number of children who are unsupervised afterschool. The survey showed that 19% of children were alone after school.

The city of Tempe's Recreation Services Division is committed to ensuring healthy, active and balanced lifestyle opportunities for all ages and abilities in the community. In addition to its year-round programs and activities, the division plays host to free, family-friendly events that focus on play and physical activity. More, however, can be done to help Tempe families be active.

Innovation Solution: Secure and implement the Play, Learn, Live, Grow Mobile

The mobile recreational program will visit Tempe's neighborhood parks after school and provide free programing for youth, allowing participants to play, learn, live and grow. The addition of the mobile

unit delivers programming directly to the community, paving the way for educational success regardless of economic status.

Impact of City Council Strategic Priorities

This program will impact three council priorities: Ensuring a safe and secure community, Developing and maintaining strong community connections and Enhancing quality of life.

Direct Impact

- 1. Ensuring a safe and secure community
 - 1.18 Achieve a community program participation rate per capita of Tempe youth during nonschool time greater than or equal to the national standards published by the Arizona After 3PM Afterschool Alliance
- 2. Enhancing quality of life
 - 3.17 Achieve ratings of "Very Satisfied" or "Satisfied" with the "Quality of Community Services programs" greater than or equal to the national benchmark cities as measured in the Community Survey.

Indirect Impact

- 1. Developing and maintaining strong community connections
 - 2.21 Achieve ratings of "Very Satisfied" or "Satisfied" with the availability of information about City programs, events, services, and issues greater than or equal to the national benchmark for cities as measured in the Community Survey.

Proposed Plan

Tempe's **Play**, **Learn**, **Live**, **Grow Mobile** is a mobile recreation program designed to create safe, fun and interactive atmospheres in neighborhood parks that encourage children to go outside and play.

The proposed pilot will take recreation programming on the road, utilizing a large cargo van outfitted with a variety of balls, jump ropes, bases and other sports equipment, games and art projects.

The program will travel throughout Tempe and provide free structured and unstructured activities for children after school for three hours per day, four days a week. The schedule will be available on the city's web site and promoted through social media outlets.

In addition to promoting outdoor play, which is declining because of the prevalence of indoor activities such as computers and video games, the Play, Learn, Live, Grow Mobile will provide supervision, mentorship and social opportunities for local youth. Staff will serve as positive role models by demonstrating how to be a good sport and practicing well-being.

The goal is to expand offerings to include additional structured and unstructured play activities, such as Kid Zone's STEM, Nutrition and other enrichment education, Library and Cultural activities and city of Tempe Police Department interactions.

The Play, Learn, Live, Grow Mobile will be instrumental in increasing opportunities for physical activity, fostering a sense of community and providing outreach. Staff will be able to inform and showcase the variety of programs, services and resources available through the city of Tempe.

The mobile unit will be available to participate at other city events like the Tempe Tardeada, Hayden's Ferry Days, Oktoberfest, Tour de Tempe, Arts Festival, Fourth of July, Movies in the Park, Halloween Carnival, PlayDay and community center events.
