

Parks & Recreation Master Plan Public Input Summary

Jan. 9-26, 2020

OVERVIEW

The City collected feedback on the research and input collected to date on the Park and Recreation Master Plan. The provided feedback will help inform the master plan to ensure it reflects the vision of the community.

Public meetings were held on Thursday, Jan. 9, 2020 (11 attendees) and Saturday, Jan. 11, 2020 (13 attendees). The topic was posted online for comments from Jan. 9 – 26, 2020 on Tempe Forum. A total of 202 unduplicated survey responses were received, 3 at the Jan. 9 public meeting, 9 at the Jan. 11 meeting and 190 on Tempe Forum.


OUTREACH


- 1. Provide places where we can be healthy and be active

This master plan will refine the current parks classification system by adding a new type of park called urban park. A park classification provides a framework for the types of facilities (for example: swings, fields, courts, and picnic areas) and activities or events that occur in a park. Urban parks are designed to be more compact and serve high density neighborhoods with limited open space.




- 1. Youth (5 -12 years old)

- 106. no uplight or glare to help preserve dark skies, quiet areas where people can have solitude, reduce urban heat island effect, plenty of recycling bins and



- 146. Tennis Courts that are free. Better sports fields at our smaller parks.


