





Neighborhood Grant Program


Goal: Provides residents with an opportunity to come together to improve their neighborhood

- Requires resident participation and involvement in the selection, coordination and completion of projects
- Must be a capital improvement, not routine maintenance or operations




Funding

- Since 1994, 660 projects completed and over \$4.8 million invested
- NEW this cycle, \$350,000 available with possible additional funds for water conservation projects
- NEW this cycle, maximum grant amount is \$20,000
- A match of at least 25% of the requested funds is required for HOAs and certified Crime Free Multi-Housing communities



Who can apply?

- Currently 83 Neighborhood and 139 Homeowners' Associations have registered with the City
- Have to INCLUDE AND INVITE everyone get input from all residents – not just board of directors or officers





What can you apply for?

A capital project that benefits the entire neighborhood and is a one-time expenditure completed by June 30, 2023.

What can't you apply for?

- HOA requests may not be for maintenance projects such as entry gates, roofing repair, common ground and pool maintenance, painting, road repair (for private streets) etc.
- Project maintenance or operation costs

Who do I involve?

- Community involvement must happen early on and throughout the project process.
- All residents of the community:
 - must be notified of the opportunity to apply for a grant



- provided a chance to propose and comment on project ideas
- ✓ be included in the final selection of the project

- Artworks located on City property need to be created by an artist who has been included on the City's prequalified list. The list can be viewed at www.tempe.gov/PublicArt
- Applicants need to select three artists from the list for a proposal and show proof of this in their application
- The arts staff will facilitate the contract and assist with the creation of the artwork as part of the grant process
- The city will maintain all artworks that are located on City owned property as part of the municipal artwork collection
- Artist proposed materials will be reviewed and discussed with city staff prior to fabrication and installation to ensure that the artworks have longevity and can be properly maintained


- HOA/ privately owned sites pick any artist you'd like to work with! You can also use the list!
- The City will not maintain these works in the future therefore care and maintenance of artworks on privately owned sites falls to the HOA and/or site owner
- The city will facilitate the contract and assist with the creation of the artwork as part of the grant process
- Artist proposed materials will be reviewed and discussed with city staff prior to fabrication and installation to ensure that the artworks have longevity and can be properly maintained



- Vehicles hurt art as well as other things
- Artworks in the medians, round abouts, and alleys need to be approved by Public Art staff before these will be able to move forward

• If considering a location where this may be an issue, consider the amount of buffer space between the proposed artwork and the vehicular traffic

- Is it accessible?
- Does it have a visual impact on the area?
- Will the artwork add a new way of looking at the site?

What do I submit?

- Application Form
- All project types:
 - ✓ Bids/ artist proposals
 - ✓ pictures, aerials from Google of where art will go
 - ✓ plans, artist renderings
 - ✓ proof of community involvement
- Specific mandatory requirements for your project type

What is evaluated?



Quality

- clear and detailed
- engages the neighborhood
- completeness of application
- budget is specific and accurate

Ability

- ability to complete the project during the fiscal year
- addresses how project will be maintained in the future

Impact

- provides an environmental benefit (i.e. water and/or energy conservation, shade)
- enhances the aesthetics
- improves health and safety
- addresses a known neighborhood deficiency
- complements other projects (private or City)



Grant Process: BEFORE Submitting your grant application

Feb. - March 2nd meeting with neighbors: discuss progress, select artist, make any necessary decisions, decide how to divvy up work

> Now- Feb./March Prepare grant application

No later than April 25, 2022 Submit your grant application to Neighborhood Services for review of completeness, earlier apps always appreciated!



APRIL 25, 2022 – SUBMIT YOUR GRANT APPLICATION to Neighborhood Services

Grant Process: AFTER submitting your grant application

May

Staff committee meets to review applications and make recommendations

July

City Council considers recommendations and votes on grant awards



August

You receive written notification of approval or denial of application as well as information as to next steps and if any permits are required

August/Sept.


Once any necessary permits are secured, City staff will notify you and artist to proceed with Project



Artist may request half of funding at this time. Submit invoice to Neighborhood Services. Second half paid after successful completion of project




Grant Process: AFTER being awarded grant
