- **B. Abney** briefed about the Financial Analyst position currently in the recruitment process:
 - This new position for the Arts & Culture Division will help maintain fiscal transparency with the community and prepare financial reporting for the Arts & Culture Commission
 - The Financial Analyst will be working division-wide and will be essential in helping to manage budgets, revenue, and grants proactively and efficiently

<u>Agenda Item 4 - Discussion: Tempe Sesquicentennial Activities</u>

- **B. Abney** presented a brief history of Tempe leading to discussion about planned activities for the Tempe Sesquicentennial event:
 - \circ Multiple departments within the City of Tempe will collaborate on a celebration event, currently scheduled for Sunday, November 7^{th} , 2021 around Tempe Town Lake.
 - A date later in the year was selected to provide more time for a successful return to in-person events in light of the pandemic.
 - Events will include live stage performances, children's activities, boating, yoga, artisan market, and opportunities for art making.
 - Tempe will create a webpage, <u>www.tempe.gov/tempe150</u>, to serve as a hub for all links, events and information regarding the sesquicentennial celebration.
 - In partnership with Downtown Tempe Authority and City of Tempe Communications Office, the first part of 2021 will be focused on communicating the event to the community through digital communication and physical signage (light poles, banners, flyers). A promotional video featuring Mayor Woods and City Council members is in production. It will be distributed to all media connections, through social media, and through the Tempe 11 YouTube channel.
 - The Tempe History Society, a non-profit organization, is planning activities based on Tempe "legends." Twenty-four legends have been chosen and two will be featured every month, one living and one that has passed. The Tempe History Society also runs an online store that will offer many items related to Tempe's history and the Sesquicentennial. Through their webpage, blog, and Facebook page, the History Society will be promoting the celebration in tandem with Tempe.
 - Tempe Historic Preservation Foundation has been planning tours for the Sesquicentennial celebration. Details include:
 - Volunteer actors are needed for live-enactment tours at the Double Butte Cemetery. Please email any recommendations to staff to be forwarded to the appropriate party.
 - One-hour historic boat tours will be offered on Tempe Town Lake.
 - Historic neighborhood tours may be offered in-person or virtually.
 - Hugh Hallman will conduct historic adobe home tours.
 - Tempe's collection of historic properties may be available for open-house tours depending on the status of the pandemic.
 - Ginny Sylvester described the opportunity for Commissioners to get involved and take on a volunteer role at one of the celebration sites or activities.
 - Michael Bennett expressed a desire to coordinate events and volunteers with Arizona State University.
 - Justin Stewart inquired whether Neighborhood Services would be involved, specifically to aid in reaching out to neighborhood associations and neighborhood leaders who may have some Tempe history to share.
 - Peggy Moroney suggested
 - Reaching out to Tempe schools to involve students in the celebration.
 - Connecting with the staff and students who created the Salt River Stories app, an assemblage of student-written stories about people in the Tempe community.
 - Maureen Kobierowski requested an early link to the promotional video featuring the Mayor, as well as potential formation of a partnership with the ASU History Department to distribute the video in their e-newsletter. She also offered to contact staff in the ASU Art Department to find volunteer student actors for the Cemetery tours.
 - Lisa Hobson suggested heavy promotion at GAIN events that precede the November Sesquicentennial celebration.



Vibrant City Grants

Cycle two awarded **8** projects and all of them are **first time** applicants. Vibrant City Arts Grants are intended to activate Tempe and build community connections through inclusive arts and culture programming. This grant is available to cultural groups, LLCs, individual artists, non-profit organizations, and arts collectives. Amount is up to \$2,500 with no match required. These projects will take place in Spring 2021.

PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS

Film Ethnographer: This virtual art program is designed to help special needs children gain positive self-image through the depiction of an autistic superhero called Focus. This remote comic art program is entitled: "Focus Loves Tempe". The students will learn about drawing human figures and Focus, the autistic superhero (exploring issues relating to human expressions to self and identity), landscapes (Tempe landmarks, relating to a sense of community identity), and visual story telling through comics.

Yes And Productions (The Ladies): Room for Two is a drive-up, pop-up performance at the City Hall Garage in Downtown Tempe. Audience members purchase a parking spot, drive-in, and watch from their car, by the light of their high-beams, and to the soundtrack broadcast through their car radios. By fusing elements of dance, interaction, improvisation, alternative comedy, and immersive theatre the result is a strange, delightful, undefinable, experience.

Marcos Fine Arts Foundation: Marcos Fine Arts Festival, is a digital event showcasing student performances. We also created an education program that will teach students the skills they need to create digital videos to share their artistic creations. Ideas from students include short plays; musical, instrumental or dance performances; and demonstrations of how their visual art pieces are created.

Kraken Still and Film: KSAF was founded by Lawrence Fung in 2018 with a small cast of dancers and composers. KSAF is an interdisciplinary dance and visual art company that celebrates a mix of styles including contemporary ballet, breaking, and contact vocabularies, as well as the use of photography and film to showcase movement in various mediums. Kraken Still & Film will host an outdoor, evening performance and film screening of their latest work at Hudson Park.

Venus Clapback: Venus Clapback is a podcast and web series hosted by two Black women. The event Therapy in the Park will collaborate with Zojo.Life a local healing directory dedicated to informing Black Women of the therapeutic resources available to us in the Valley. The event will utilize mindfulness, breath work and yoga with interviews from healers and therapists focusing on the importance of their work.

Nayika- Woman Reimagined: Nayika is a new musical theatre piece born out of the need for authentic stories about the experience of women throughout history. Inspired by the Indian classical art concept of the Ashtanayikas, eight fictional characters created over 3,000 years ago, Nayika takes a fresh approach by updating the stories of these women. Nayika will happen as a two part project. The first part is the creation of the album/mixtape. The second part of this project is the live workshop and first live performance at ASU's Tempe Campus.

Coley Curry: Four womxn, four artists, black and POC, will facilitate a series of intimate talks/workshops on journeying towards other economies. These workshops are based in storytelling, ritual, centering body/spiritual/life work, and unlearning (and healing from) current dominant economic realities. By sharing strategies, tools and history around money and compensation participants are practicing and taking an active role in resisting existing economic structures that have historically and currently oppressed our communities and artistic practices.

Melanie Sainz: This project is entitled "Friendship Shared One Bead at a Time." The mission of this project is to foster an understanding of the connection to the natural world and the importance of adornment amongst the various tribes of Native American/First Nations people of North America. This program will be made available to the constituents of the Native American Program at the Tempe Elementary School District. An instructional video and supply kits will be made available to participants.

Clyde is working with the Public Art staff to create a narrated coloring book that will be downloadable and available in print form. The book will include line drawings of the mural and limited text that helps to share the artist's imagination and thought process.

Artist Bobby Zokaites (Zone 4), artist Mary Lucking (Zone 3), and artists Simon Donovan and Ben Olsted installed their artworks this past month. Artist Koryn Rolstad (Zone 1/ Rio Salado) is expected to begin install in March, subject to schedule changes due to the pandemic.

Tempe Town Lake Temporary Art

The selection panel reviewed submissions in early November and has recommended artist Kris Manzanares receive the commission. This will be her first commission with the City of Tempe. Staff is working with her to create a contract at present and expects to begin work on shortly. The current artwork, RISE, was deinstalled at the end of January per the artist contract in place. It is anticipated that a new artwork will be installed in 2021.

Tempe Youth Library Temporary Art

Artist Shela Yu has begun working with the City to finalize design for the installation at the Tempe Youth Library. It is expected that she will install beginning in the spring with completion before the summer months.

Yu's concept includes a mural as well as a sculptural element made of hand painted books. These books will be created through a workshop with tweens and teens (the users of the space) in late spring or early summer. The workshop may be either virtual in person to be determined as Covid metrics are assessed.


Country Club Way Public Art

Christopher Jagmin Proposal for Hollis Park Play area




Artist Christopher Jagmin is working to complete design for the rubber surface of the play areas at Corbell, Hollis, and Indian Bend Parks this fiscal year.

Construction will begin on all parks this fall and the artist designed surface will be installed in late Janurary or February 2021 as the final step

ADOT Pedestrian Bridge Project

Artist: coLab Studio





After a competitive selection process complete with artist interviews, coLab Studio / Matthew and Maria Salenger have been commissioned to work on this project.

Design is complete from the art side and has been included in the construction bid package that ADOT is currently circulating.

The bridges will cross the I-10 at Alameda Road and Western Canal, joining the east and west side of Tempe for cyclist and pedestrian use. Bridge and landing design concepts will be underway throughout the fall with construction beginning in 2021 and spanning through 2024.

Artists Ryan Shea (Tempe Beach Park) and Eli McGlothern (Daley Park) have completed installation.

IN FLUX partners are looking to fall 2021 for Cycle 10 due to possible budget reductions. We are looking at how to move forward with the current cycle and discussing what will be possible for the next. Details will be provided as soon as they are available. Partners include Scottsdale Public Art, Phoenix Office of Arts and Culture, Chandler Public Art, Peoria Public Art, Glendale Public Art, and Artlink.

Conservation / Maintenance

Public Art works that have been recently refurbished or will are currently in process include:

- 1. Tempe Canal Monuments at Tempe Canal Artist Kevin Berry is under contract and working with the general contractor hired by the City to repair this monumental work. It is anticipated that the repairs will be complete by February 2021.
- 2. The Cyclist's Feat this project is placed in a chicane on Farmer Street and has been subjected to several vehicular accidents over the past 5 years. We are currently in conversation with transportation, the neighborhood, TBAG, and the artist to see if there is a way to conserve this artwork. At present it has been determined that the transportation department will add lighting to all chicanes in an effort to ensure their safety. Once complete, Public Art will have the artist repair the piece for the final time as a means to see if this can curtail the ongoing damage. It has been agreed that if this solution does not work, TACC will be presented with the issue for discussion. A second chicane that is part of the same project was hit by a vehicle over Labor Day Weekend, making this two damaged areas of the same artwork this year. The city is working with police to see if information about the driver can be obtained to offset the repair costs.

Four neighborhood associations have been awarded Public Art related grants through the Mary Anne Corder Grant program for the FY20-21 cycle. These projects are:



- 1. Daley Park Artist: Daniel Hornung. Entrance wall at Rural. The neighborhood is still working on finalizing design and artworks for this site.
- 2. Optimist Park NE, SE, NW, SW (4 associations)— Artist John Randall Nelson is working with the City, the neighborhoods, and the contractor for the El Paso Pathway project to begin work on this project now.
- 3. Rural Geneva Artist: Joan Baron. Standpipe in Meyer Park. The neighborhood is still working on finalizing design and artworks for this site.
- 4. University Heights Artist Jennyfer Stratman. Sculpture at Lemon and Dorsey. Artist Jennyfer Stratman is working with the neighborhood and the City on this project. Stratman is working with a local metal fabricator on this piece and staff will be the liaisons for the process.

- 7. Tempe Market Station early stage, no artist selected yet
- 8. 206 S Farmer early stage, no artist selected yet
- 9. Playa del Norte Owner has opted to pay in lieu of fee
- 10. University Business Campus Artist: Daniel Moore
- 11. 6th street Hotel early stage, no artist selected yet
- 12. U-Haul Storage early stage, no artist selected yet
- 13. The Beam Art submittal was reviewed by internal committee and will be presented to TACC in October.
