 City Council will be reviewing the Arts & Culture Division CIP budget requests at the March 18 meeting.

- Reopening facilities: Currently planning a limited reopening of facilities on April 6th and include the Gallery at TCA and the Lobby and Community Room at the Museum with limited visitation into the gallery space. The opening will not include groups or rentals until Covid-19 numbers get to safe levels. Staff will continue to evaluate the situation each month. Some in-person events will be held outdoors in the courtyard with limited visitation numbers and social distancing.
- Kara Osburn, Financial Analyst Arts & Culture, requested feedback on what TACC would like to be informed about in financial reports.
 - TACC requests that Kara use her best judgement on what to include, then TACC can give feedback on any edits.
- **Eileen May**, General Manager of Tempe Center for the Arts, spoke about new ways to boost revenue for the next fiscal year and finding ways to recover lost revenue during the pandemic:
 - Shuttered Venues Grant (Operators Grant) is specifically for live event venues and those impacted with sale of tickets. TCA will be applying in April.
 - Currently business planning for the following: bring back lost clients, attract new clients, food and beverage services, membership programs in collaboration with Friends of TCA.

RECAP: LOUD X

LOUD started as a showcase for how music was played outdoors before PA systems. Bands used brass instruments to get loud. Now in its 10th year, LOUD features some of the best musicians in Tempe. The two bands this year were The *Sugar Thieves* and *Valenzuela/Zubia*. The 2021 event rocked the plaza on Sat., Mar. 27. At the conclusion, a short video honoring the late Lawrence Zubia - founder of Tempe-based



band The Pistoleros - was projected onto the museum.



Approximately 300 masked attendees enjoyed this live, socially distanced outdoor concert in the courtyard in front of the museum. Scavenger Hunt 150: Tempe Canals



Featured Exhibit: Video Invaders

Through Sep. 2021

The *Video Invaders* exhibition about gaming in Tempe is finally open for visitation and hands-on play. Packed full of information and artifacts related to video games, the exhibit includes actual cabinet and console games, as well as pinball machines that can be played – for free – by visitors.

Pascua Yaqui Tribal Grant

The museum was awarded a \$12,000 grant from the Pascua Yaqui Tribe to create a traveling exhibit about the Pascua Yaqui people of Guadalupe. The exhibit is projected to be completed by summer of 2022 and will first be displayed at the Guadalupe Historical Society, and then travel back to the Tempe History Museum for viewing.

Tempe Public Art April 2021

Westside Multigenerational Center

Clyde's mural at the Westside Multigenerational Center will have an unveiling on May 7th at 10am. All commissioners have been invited. This will be a limited event held outdoors with masks. We hope you can come meet the artist and see the completed mural!

The Westside Center will begin phased reopening this summer. At that time, the artwork will be publicly accessible. The accompanying coloring book and prints will also be available. The final prints will be on display at the Connections Café in the library once open to the public.

Tempe Town Lake Temporary Art

Artist Kris Manzanares is now under contract and has begun to work with city to determine how best to begin design work. Kris is looking for textiles from the community to use in her sculptural lanterns. She is currently working on creating a donation system with a delivery box to be placed at the entrance to the Tempe Public Library. Her lantern sculpture will be installed in late August or early September, subject to the monsoon season.

Tempe Youth Library Temporary Art

Artist Shela Yu is almost done with the mural portion of her installation at the Tempe Youth Library. Yu will be offering a workshop for tweens where she will guide them through the process of designing their own book jacket cover. Participants will be provided materials and a solid, painted hard cover book by Yu upon registering for the workshop. The workshop will be held twice, once in the evening on April 29th and then again on the morning of May 1st to give options for families and busy tweens. The completed books may be used by the artist as part of her final installation at the Library.





Edna Vihel Center Temporary Art

Artist Koryn Woodward Wasson created a mural on the interior of the Edna Arts Center last year that is being extended to the exterior! The exterior installation is in process and will be completed by mid April. The artist was inspired by growth and connections to our home in the desert. The entry columns will be painted to accompany the artwork installation, bringing a dynamic entrance to the site for visitors of all ages.

Country Club Way Public Art

Artist Bobby Zokaites was selected to receive this commission. Zokaites has begun working with the team to integrate his concepts into the overall project plan. The project includes a 3.5 mile stretch of connections with up to 4 shade nodes. The concept that the artist has brought to the project includes looking at sundials as a means to tracing time, both hourly and historically, and using the shade features and seating as a means to create time pieces. Zokaites and the team will be working on the design portion of this project through the end of summer 2021.

Currently in the construction process:

Play Areas/Rubberized Surface




Artist Christopher Jagmin's design for the rubber surface at Hollis Park Play Area is in the correct placement. The park is expected to open for the public at the end of April, date yet to be determined.

Jagmin created design for the play areas of Corbell and Indian Bend Parks as well. These projects will begin construction on the art portion towards the end of the April.

ADOT Pedestrian Bridge Project

Artist: coLab Studio





After a competitive selection process complete with artist interviews, coLab Studio / Matthew and Maria Salenger have been commissioned to work on this project.

The bridges will cross the I-10 at Alameda Road and Western Canal, joining the east and west side of Tempe for cyclist and pedestrian use. Bridge and landing design concepts will be underway throughout the fall with construction beginning in 2021 and spanning through 2024. The design/build construction team has begun working with the City now and it is anticipated that the art portion will be underway towards the end of the construction process.

Conservation / Maintenance

Public Art works that have been recently refurbished or will are currently in process include:

- 1. The Cyclist's Feat this project is placed in a chicane on Farmer Street and has been subjected to several vehicular accidents over the past 5 years. We are currently in conversation with transportation, the neighborhood, TBAG, and the artist to see if there is a way to conserve this artwork. We are working closely with all parties to determine if the artwork can be relocated to a less vulnerable location within the neighborhood now.
- 2. Extraordinarily Common One of the four sculptures in Evelyn Hallman Park was cut from its plinth and taken 2 weeks ago. We are working with the police, parks, and the artist to repair the artwork. There has been a police report filed however there are no suspects at this time.

Four neighborhood associations have been awarded Public Art related grants through the Mary Anne Corder Grant program for the FY20-21 cycle. These projects are:



- 1. Daley Park Artist: Daniel Hornung. Entrance wall at Rural. The neighborhood is still working on finalizing design and artworks for this site.
- 2. Optimist Park NE, SE, NW, SW (4 associations)— Artist John Randall Nelson is working with the City, the neighborhoods, and the contractor for the El Paso Pathway project to begin work on this project now.
- 3. Rural Geneva Artist: Joan Baron. Standpipe in Meyer Park. The neighborhood is still working on finalizing design and artworks for this site.
- 4. University Heights Artist Jennyfer Stratman. Sculpture at Lemon and Dorsey. Artist Jennyfer Stratman is working with the neighborhood and the City on this project. Stratman is working with a local metal fabricator on this piece and staff will be the liaisons for the process.

These projects are in various stages of design and completion. Those listed do not include developments that have opted to pay in lieu of developing an artwork on their site:

- 1. Discovery Business Campus —Phase II is in the works, at an early design phase level. Artist is unknown at this time.
- 2. The Grand at Papago Park Center Artist: Mary Lucking, artwork is complete. The owner is waiting to create a press release for the opening post pandemic. Currently, all buildings are vacated while the tenants work remotely therefore the artwork is not publicly accessible.
- 3. IDEA campus Artist Matthew Moore and Jay Atherton of Ryne Studio were commissioned and are working with Boyer now. The artwork has been installed. The artist is currently working with Boyer to complete the landscape work around the artwork. The artist is also working on interpretive signage as advised by TACC in February 2020.
- 4. 100 Mill Ave (+ Rio Salado) Art submittal was reviewed and approved by the committee. TACC reviewed in July.
- 5. Precision Fleet Artist: David Brandt, installation occurred last week! No photos to share yet!
- 6. Tempe Market Station early stage, no artist selected yet
- 7. 206 S Farmer early stage, no artist selected yet
- 8. University Business Campus Artist: Daniel Moore
- 9. 6th street Hotel early stage, no artist selected yet
- 10. U-Haul Storage early stage, no artist selected yet
- 11. The Beam Artist: coLab Studio, in design now
- 12. The Vib Artist: Laurie Lundquist, waiting for art submittal now
- 13. Tempe Depot new project, no artist selected yet
- 14. South Pier new project, no artist selected yet
- 15. Carvana new project, no artist selected yet
- 16. South Harl (former Insight building)- this site has been purchased by a new owner who intends to keep the existing artwork by artists Mark McDowell and David Venesky. The owner will work with the artist to relocate it to a better location within the campus. In addition, the owner will commission more art pieces for the site.
