Message from the Chief

It is my honor to present to you, the Tempe Fire Medical Rescue Department's 2021 Annual Report. This report is intended to provide details about the remarkable services each member of our department contributes to every day. On the following pages, you will find the highlights of the Tempe Fire Medical Rescue Department 2021 year in review. While most people readily identify with our medical, fire and special operations services, they may not grasp the expertise the fire medical rescue department provides in other areas. Such areas include building and fire code enforcements, plan review of buildings, fire prevention and suppression systems, emergency planning for community events, fleet management, emergency medical transportation and public education.

As I composed the 2021 message, I reflected on the challenges we faced as a department and a community in 2020. We faced the beginning of a pandemic, a train derailment, and the tragic loss of Firefighter Tommy Arriaga. Both the pandemic and train derailment were extremely challenging but resulted in very positive outcomes due to the commitment and training of our membership. It has been two years since Tommy passed and we celebrated his life during a remembrance ceremony at the Tempe Training Facility on March 6th. Tommy continues to remind us, every day, how lucky we are to be a part of Tempe Fire Medical Rescue -- something he truly loved -- and how fragile life can be. He also reminds us, "it's cool to be clean!". January 15, 2021, marked 41 years since we lost Firefighter Paramedic Ed Gaicki. Due to the COVID restrictions, we were unable to celebrate Ed's life like we had done for so many years in the past. Both Arriaga and Gaicki were gone too soon, but the memory of each will always be in our hearts.

On January 26, 2020, Arizona reported the first COVID-19 case, bringing the nationwide total to five. On March 20, 2020, the World Health Organization officially declared COVID-19 a global pandemic. The last pandemic we encountered was H1N1 in 2009. Throughout 2021 Tempe Fire Medical Rescue faced many new challenges brought on by several new variant waves. We continued to face a myriad of critical needs to prevent, respond to and control the spread of COVID-19. All the members of TFMRD have faced these challenges with grit, determination, and selflessness. I am thankful for the work they do to protect our community, especially as a global pandemic has added extra obstacles and a form of danger we had not encountered in the past.

In 2022 we will continue to provide for the safety of Tempe residents, visitors, and workforce. We will continue to adapt to any future COVID-19 waves. We will continue to work toward several planned programs and projects. A few of the big projects include starting construction on Station 2, placing BC272 into service, two more ambulances and a new ladder truck in-service. Our commitment to serving our community is made possible through the ongoing support we receive from the

citizens of Tempe, Mayor, City Council, City Manager, Tempe Chapter of Local 493 and City Departments.

I'm honored to have been given the opportunity to continue to serve this department and community as the Fire Medical Rescue Chief.

Grants & Donations Received

- Arizona Department of Homeland Security; \$108,942 to cover the cost of training for the Department's technical rescue and hazardous materials teams.
- Arizona Department of Homeland Security; \$16,200 to pay for training for the Department's Threat Liaison Officer (TLO) program.

Looking Forward

New Apparatus- TFMR will take delivery of four E-One pumpers. These new pumpers will be on the E-One Typhoon chassis, each with a 1500 gpm pump and 500 and 40 gallon water and foam tanks. The trucks will be designed with several features which will improve safety and help to protect the health of our fire-fighters. The department will also be designing and purchasing a ninth ambulance, a high rise response support truck, and an aerial apparatus in FY 2023, all of which will most likely be placed into service sometime in early FY 2024.

Fire Station 2- Construction of a new fire station on the property of the existing Fire Station 2 will begin in FY 2023. The new facility will allow for improved health and safety of firefighters as well as improved response times due to a more modern functional configuration. The larger space will enable the department to accommodate ambulance service from the station in a manner that is not possible now.

Fire Training Center- The first phase of this project is complete for the Skills Building repair which was in accordance with a structural evaluation conducted in 2012. Design work for the burn room prop is complete and construction will begin in FY 2023. The Fire Training Center Burn Room building was constructed in 1993. Extensive use of the facility and the significant benefits derived from firefighter training directly impact the delivery of service to the community. The burn room prop sustains incremental damage with each live fire training, and thus the life of the structure is limited. A modern, redesigned burn prop will facilitate training on techniques which will equip the departments firefighters to mitigate structure fires quickly and safely.

Fire Station 1- This year, construction will begin to renovate the bathroom facilities at station 1. The long-term intent of the department is to retrofit the current group showers at all TFMR stations which still do not have individual private showers (stations 1,3, and 6). This will improve the privacy each member will have when taking a shower or using the bathroom facilities and improve working conditions for all employees at the stations. These renovations are in line with the recommendation for fire stations per the 2018 FEMA report by the US Fire Administration, "Safety and Health Considerations for the design of Fire and Emergency Medical Services Stations."
