### Letter of Interest, Kyrene Water Reclamation Facility

Mayor Woods submitted a letter of interest to the Army Corps of Engineers urging support for the Kyrene Reclamation Facilities and Improvements Capital Program now that the facility has a Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) designation. The letter is attached. Information on the federal visit to the facility was included in the 9/2/22 Weekly Information Packet. Earlier efforts on the WRDA designation were included in the 5/20/22 Weekly memo.

### **PHX East Valley Partnership Representation**

Councilmember Randy Keating has been named as Tempe's representative on the PHX East Valley Partnership Board. The Maricopa Regional Continuum of Care works with a diverse array of partners to develop regional solutions to end homelessness.

#### Brownfields Grant Application Now Open

Supported by a historic \$1.5 billion investment from President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (IIJA), the application for FY 2023 Brownfields Multipurpose, Assessment, Revolving Loan Fund, and Cleanup Grants (MARC) is now open. Local governments are eligible to apply.

Grants offered by this program are used for the clean-up and reuse of Brownfield properties including direct funding and technical assistance for planning, clean-up, environmental assessments, and community outreach.

The Save America's Treasures program was established in 1998 and since inception has awarded more than \$356 million in grants to over 1,320 projects across the country. Funded through the Historic Preservation Fund, SAT grants are divided in to two separate applications, one for preservation grants and one for projects involving collections.

Applications are due Tuesday, December, 20, 2022.

Re: Arizona Environmental Infrastructure Program

Dear Colonel Balten:

This letter respectfully requests consideration that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers provide design and construction assistance for the Kyrene Reclamation Facilities and Improvements Capital Program under Section 595 of the Arizona Environmental Infrastructure Authority or Section 219 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2022, as amended for Tempe, Arizona.

As fiscal year 2023 work plan requests continue to be formulated, the City of Tempe urges support for inclusion of the Kyrene Reclamation Facilities and Improvements Capital Program, which incorporates recommissioning of the Kyrene Reclamation Facility (KRF) and associated recharge infrastructure. Projects under this program for consideration include:

- Recharge Well 3 Equipping Construction (Estimated Cost \$3M; Federal Funds \$2.25M; Local Match \$750K). This portion of the project will provide additional recharge capacity to store reclaimed water from the KRF in the underground aquifer for future recovery from the City's potable water wells. The well has been drilled in preparation for this equipping project. Design and permitting of the equipping are underway and anticipated to be complete in the summer of 2023. If awarded, construction could be completed in the next 20 months.
- Recharge Well 4 Equipping Construction (Estimated Cost \$3.8 M; Federal Funds \$2.85M; Local Match \$950K). This portion of the project will provide the remaining needed recharge capacity to store reclaimed water from the KRF in the underground aquifer for future recovery from the City's potable water wells. The well is scheduled to be drilled in the summer of 2023 in preparation for this equipping project. Design and permitting of the equipping are underway and anticipated to be complete in the summer of 2023. If awarded, construction could be completed in the next 20 months.
- Recharge Well Pipelines (Estimated Cost \$4.5M; Federal Funds \$3.38M; Local Match \$1.13M). This portion of the project will construct the pipelines needed to deliver reclaimed water from the KRF to the recharge wells, Salt River Project Kyrene Generating Station (for cooling water), and Ken McDonald Golf Course Lakes (for irrigation). Design and permitting of the pipelines are underway and is anticipated to be complete in the summer of 2023. If awarded, construction could be completed in the next 20 months.



City of Tempe P.O. Box 5002 31 East Fifth Street Tempe, AZ 85280 480-350-8225 KRF Recommissioning Construction (Estimated Cost \$27.4M; Federal Funds \$20.55M; Local Match \$6.85M). The existing KRF has been off-line more than 10 years. This portion of the project includes extensive rehabilitation and reconstruction of the facility that encompasses equipment refurbishment and replacement, concrete repairs, basin recoating, electrical upgrades and control systems replacement to bring the facility back to full operational status. Design and permitting has recently started and is scheduled for completion in spring of 2024. If awarded, construction could be completed in the next 38 months.

Thank you for your consideration of this critical water resource project for the City of Tempe, during a critical time of drought in the southwest. Funding for this project will have a tremendous benefit to solidifying Tempe's water supply during times of drought into the future. # Green organics diversion, compost program adjustments

Facts, figures, customer affects

In the coming years, solid waste services will be relocated to the Tempe Municipal Operations Center, a new site that does not have adequate space to accommodate the city's compost facility. Once relocated, processing green organic material into compost will no longer be feasible.



Tempe will continue to provide residents with curbside and bulk green organic collection services.

The Municipal Utilities (MU) Department, however, remains committed to continuing green organics collection for reuse as stated in the City Council Priorities' Performance Measure 4.04 - Solid Waste Landfill Diversion, and there will be no changes to the residential curbside or bulk green organic collection services.

Additionally, MU has procured two vendors to provide green organics composting and landfill diversion service. Once in place, Tempe will phase out its service and anticipate full closure of its compost facility in early 2023.

Currently, the city's compost program is funded primarily by residential solid waste customers. Using a third-party vendor will result in a cost savings in the Solid Waste Fund associated with this business process change, which will be passed on to residential customers and factored into the next solid waste rate adjustments.

Tempe residents also will benefit from discounted pricing for compost from these vendors as part of this contract award.



A green organics container for curbside collection is available in select areas.

The <u>Gro-Well Brands</u> facility, located at 2807 S. 27th Ave., Phoenix, is offering a 10% discount off the list price for bagged compost. <u>CTS Greenwaste Recycling</u>, located at 11501 S. Sossaman Road, Mesa, is offering a \$38 buy back per cubic yard.

Shortly, the Communication and Marketing team will produce a document of recommended messages and place them in Council's SharePoint messaging folder. The team also will be working with Municipal Utilities to provide ample information about the change to customers through several communication tools, including signage at the site.





Tempe remains committed to creating a sustainable environment while reducing materials going into the landfill.

- Community Safety Strategic Plan





















# **Filtering with Chart Elements**

Chart filtering will not hold across pages





# **Comparison Data: Census Demographics**




## Labor Force Demographic Data
