### **Executive Summary**



#### **Purpose and Methodology**

ETC Institute conducted the fifteenth annual community survey for the City of Tempe during the summer of 2022 to help determine priorities for the community as part of the City's on-going strategic planning process. The survey was mailed to a random sample of households in the City of Tempe. Once the surveys were mailed, ETC Institute sent emails and text messages to the households that received the survey to encourage participation. The emails and texts contained a link to the online survey (<a href="www.tempe.gov/communitysurvey">www.tempe.gov/communitysurvey</a>) to make it easy for residents to complete the survey.


To prevent people who were not residents of Tempe from participating, everyone who completed the survey online was required to enter their home address prior to submitting the survey. ETC Institute then matched the addresses that were entered online with the addresses that were originally selected for the random sample. If the address from a survey completed online did not match one of the addresses selected for the sample, the online survey was not counted.

A total of 934 households completed the survey. The results for the sample of 934 households have a 95% level of confidence with a precision of at least +/-3.2%. There were no statistically significant

differences in the results of the survey based on the method of administration.

**Location of Respondents**. To better understand how well services are being delivered in different parts of the City, the home address of respondents to the survey was geocoded. The dots on the map to the right show the distribution of survey respondents based on the location of their home.

Don't Know Responses. Since the number of "don't know" responses often reflects the utilization and awareness of City services, the percentage of "don't know" responses has been included with the tabular data in Section 5 of this report. When the "don't know" responses have been excluded, the text of this report will indicate that the responses have been excluded with the phrase "who had an opinion."

#### **Perceptions of the Community**

Based on the combined percentages of the residents surveyed who had an opinion, 78% were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the overall quality of services offered by the City of Tempe.

#### **Public Safety**

- Ninety percent (90%) of the residents surveyed who had an opinion were "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with the quality of local fire services; 9% were "neutral." Other public safety services with high levels of satisfaction include: quality of medical services provided by the Fire Department (89%), quality of ambulance services (81%), and quality and safety of structures in neighborhoods (77%).
- Eighty-three percent (83%) of residents who had an opinion were "satisfied" with their feeling of safety at the Tempe Public Library Complex during the day; 12% were "neutral."
   Other areas in which residents felt safe during the day include: within the home or neighborhood (77%), businesses (theaters, restaurants, retail shopping, workplace) (76%), City athletic and recreational facilities (74%), and City Hall (73%).
- Sixty-seven percent (67%) of residents who had an opinion were satisfied with their feeling
  of safety within their home or neighborhood at night; 18% were "neutral." Other areas in
  which residents felt safe at night include: businesses (theaters, restaurants, retail shopping,
  workplace) (66%), and in the Tempe Public Library Complex (61%).
- Sixty-five percent (65%) of residents who had an opinion indicated they were "occasionally" or "frequently" worried about having their car stolen or broken into; 60% were "occasionally" or "frequently" worried about being a victim of identity theft, and 56% were "occasionally" or "frequently" worried about having their home burglarized when they are not there.



#### **Quality of Life and City Services**

• The highest levels of satisfaction with quality of life and City services in Tempe, among those who had an opinion, included: quality of Tempe Public Library (85%), residential trash collection services (84%), quality of City library programs and services (81%), residential recycling services (81%), bulk trash pickup/removal services (77%), quality of larger City parks (75%), quality of life in the City (75%), quality of City recreation centers (74%), and maintenance and appearance of City recreation and community centers (72%).

#### **Financial Stability and Vitality**

 The highest levels of satisfaction with various aspects of financial stability and vitality in Tempe, among those who had an opinion, included: the financial stability of City (61%), the direction the City is heading (57%), and the overall value received for City tax dollars and fees (56%).

#### **Sustainable Growth and Development**

• The highest levels of satisfaction with various aspects of sustainable growth and development in Tempe, among those who had an opinion, included: quality of recycling services (78%), the condition and clarity of street signs (75%), quality of walking and biking paths (72%), and the quality of local transit service (71%).

#### Communication

- The three information sources that residents use most to get information about the City of Tempe include: the water bill newsletter (Tempe Today) (65%), City websites (63%), and TV news (35%).
- The highest levels of satisfaction with various aspects of communication in Tempe, among those who had an opinion, included: the availability of information on water/wastewater (sewer) and solid waste rates (77%), the availability of information about City programs, events, services, and issues (76%), the availability of information on recycling, composting, and water conservation program offerings (74%), and Tempe's online services (registration, payment, etc.) (71%). Residents were least satisfied with their ability to participate in the City's decision-making process (47%).




#### **Customer Service**

- Overall, 72% of residents who had an opinion were satisfied with the quality of customer service provided by the City of Tempe.
- Forty-eight percent (48%) of residents surveyed indicated they had contacted the City of Tempe during the past year.
- The highest levels of satisfaction with customer service, based upon the "yes" responses among those who had an opinion and had contacted the City over the past year, were: the honesty of the employee (95%), the way they were treated fairly (94%), and the ability of the employee to listen carefully (93%).

#### **Top Priorities for the City**


Residents think police services and social/human services should be the City's top priorities

fire prevention services, and maintenance of City buildings were the least selected priorities.






#### Q1. Satisfaction With Public Safety




### Q2. Feeling of Safety <u>During the Day</u> in the Following Places:






# Q4.2. Has anyone in your household age 12 or older had a vehicle stolen, property or cash stolen, or has your household been burglarized?




#### Q4a. What was the reason it was not reported to the police?



### Q6. Satisfaction With Various Perceptions of the City (1/2)




### Q6. Satisfaction With Various Perceptions of the City (2/2)




### Q7. Satisfaction With Various Aspects of 3-1-1 Service

by percentage of respondents who have contacted 311 (excluding "Don't Know" responses)




### Q8. Satisfaction With the Ease of Access to the Following




## Q9. Have You Contacted the City of Tempe During the Past Year?

by percentage of respondents




# Q10. Use of City Services/Facilities by Respondents and Their Household Members During the Past 12 Months




#### Q11. Top THREE Priorities for the City Over the Next Year




### Q13. Satisfaction With Quality of Life and City Services (1/4)








# Q14. Top THREE Priorities for the City Over the Next Year to Support an Age-Friendly Community (50+ Years)






# Q16. Satisfaction with Various Aspects of the City's Financial Stability and Vitality




### Q18. Importance of Issues Facing the Community


# Q19. Importance of the Types of New Housing Tempe Should Encourage Over the Next 30 Years

by percentage of respondents (excluding "Not Provided" responses)






## Q23. Demographics: Approximately how many years have you lived in Tempe?




### Q24. Demographics: What is your age?




#### Q25. Demographics: What gender do you identify with?




### Q26. Demographics: How many children in each of the following age groups live in Tempe with you?

by percentage of children in the home




## Q27. Demographics: Which of the following best describes your race/ethnicity?










# Q30. Demographics: What barriers are preventing you from using the internet to connect with education, government services, social media, and information?






### Q31. Demographics: What is the highest level of education that you have completed?








# Q33. Demographics: With "10" representing the best possible life for you and "0" representing the worst, how would you say you personally feel you stand at this time?




# Q34. Demographics: With "10" representing the best possible life for you and "0" representing the worst, how do you think you will stand about five years from now?








### Trends: Q2-1. Feeling of Safety During the Day 2022, 2021, & 2018












### Trends: Q10. Use of City Services/Facilities During Past 12 Months (1/2) - 2022, 2021, & 2018




### Trends: Q10. Use of City Services/Facilities During Past 12 Months (2/2) - 2022, 2021, & 2018




### Trends: Q13. Satisfaction With Quality of Life and City Services (1/4) 2022, 2021, & 2007











#### **Benchmarking Analysis**



#### **Overview**

ETC Institute's *DirectionFinder*® program was originally developed in 1999 to help community leaders across the United States use statistically valid community survey data as a tool for making better decisions. Since November 1999, the survey has been administered in more than 300 cities and counties in 49 states. Most participating communities conduct the survey on an annual or biennial basis.

This report contains benchmarking data from three sources: (1) a national survey that was administered by ETC institute during the fall of 2021 that is part of a random sample of over 9,000 residents in the continental United States, (2) individual community surveys that were administered in 28 similar-sized communities (population of 75,000 to 200,000) from January 2020 to August 2022, which includes several communities with colleges and universities. #### **Interpreting the Performance Range Charts**


The charts on the following pages provide comparisons for several items that were rated on the survey. The horizontal bars show the range of satisfaction among residents in communities with populations between 100,000 and 250,000 that have participated in a *DirectionFinder®* survey since 2020. The lowest and highest satisfaction ratings are listed to the left and right of each bar. The yellow dot on each bar shows how the results for Tempe compare to the average for the communities with a population between 100,000 and 250,000 which is shown as a vertical dash in the middle of each horizontal bar. If the yellow dot is located to the right of the vertical dash, the City of Tempe rated above the average. If the yellow dot is located to the left of the vertical dash, the City of Tempe rated below the average.

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

#### Tempe vs. U.S. vs. Similar-Sized Cities









## Importance-Satisfaction Analysis



#### **Overview**

Today, community leaders have limited resources which need to be targeted to activities that are of the most benefit to their citizens. Two of the most important criteria for decision making are (1) to target resources toward services of the <u>highest importance to citizens</u>; and (2) to target resources toward those services where <u>citizens</u> are the least satisfied.

The Importance-Satisfaction (I-S) rating is a unique tool that allows public officials to better understand both of these highly important decision-making criteria for each of the services they are providing. The Importance-Satisfaction (I-S) rating is based on the concept that public agencies will maximize overall customer satisfaction by emphasizing improvements in those areas where the level of satisfaction is relatively low, and the perceived importance of the service is relatively high.

The rating is calculated by summing the percentage of responses for items selected as the first, second, and third most important services for the City to provide. The sum is then multiplied by 1 minus the percentage of respondents who indicated they were positively satisfied with the City's performance in the related area (the sum of the ratings of 4 and 5 on a 5-point scale excluding "Don't Know" responses). "Don't Know" responses are excluded from the calculation to ensure the satisfaction ratings among service categories are comparable.

#### I-S Rating = Importance x (1-Satisfaction)

#### **Example of the Calculation**

Respondents were asked to identify the major categories of City services that were most important to their household. One-third (33.2%) of the respondent households selected "police services" as one of the most important services to emphasize over the next year.

With regard to satisfaction, 67.1% of respondents surveyed rated "police services" as a "4" or "5" on a 5-point scale (where "5" means "Very Satisfied") excluding "Don't Know" responses. The I-S rating was calculated by multiplying the sum of the most important percentages by one minus the sum of the satisfaction percentages. In this example, 33.2% was multiplied by 32.9% (1-0.671). This calculation yielded an I-S rating of 0.1092, which ranked second out of fifteen categories of City services analyzed.

## **Importance-Satisfaction Analysis**



The maximum rating is 1.00 and would be achieved when 100% of the respondents select an item as one of their top three choices of importance and 0% indicate they are positively satisfied with the delivery of the service.

The lowest rating is 0.00 and could be achieved under either of the following two situations:

- If 100% of the respondents were positively satisfied with the delivery of the service
- If none (0%) of the respondents selected the service as one of the three most important areas.

#### **Interpreting the Ratings**

Ratings that are greater than or equal to 0.20 identify areas that should receive significantly more emphasis over the next two years. Ratings from 0.10 to 0.20 identify service areas that should receive increased emphasis. Ratings less than 0.10 should continue to receive the current level of emphasis.

- <u>Definitely Increase</u> Emphasis (I-S > 0.20)
- Increase Current Emphasis (I-S = 0.10 0.20)
- Maintain Current Emphasis (I-S < 0.10)

Most Important %:

The "Most Important" percentage represents the sum of the first, second, and third most important responses for each item. Respondents were asked to identify the item they think should be the top priority over the next year.

Satisfaction %:

The "Satisfaction" percentage represents the sum of the ratings "5" and "4" excluding 'don't knows.' Respondents ranked their level of satisfaction with each of the items on a scale of 5 to 1 with "5" being Very Satisfied and "1" being Very Dissatisfied.

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## **Importance-Satisfaction Analysis**



#### **Importance-Satisfaction Matrix Analysis**

The Importance-Satisfaction rating is based on the concept that public agencies will maximize overall customer satisfaction by emphasizing improvements in those areas where the level of satisfaction is relatively low, and the perceived importance of the service is relatively high. ETC Institute developed an Importance-Satisfaction Matrix to display the perceived importance of major services that were assessed on the survey against the perceived quality of service delivery. The two axes on the matrix represent Satisfaction (vertical) and relative Importance (horizontal).

The I-S (Importance-Satisfaction) matrix should be interpreted as follows.

- Continued Emphasis (above average importance and above average satisfaction). This area shows where the City is meeting customer expectations. Items in this area have a significant impact on the customer's overall level of satisfaction. The City should maintain (or slightly increase) emphasis on items in this area.
- Exceeding Expectations (below average importance and above average satisfaction). This area shows where the City is performing significantly better than customers expect the City to perform. Items in this area do not significantly affect the overall level of satisfaction that residents have with City services. The City should maintain (or slightly decrease) emphasis on items in this area.
- Opportunities for Improvement (above average importance and below average satisfaction). This area shows where the City is not performing as well as residents expect the City to perform. This area has a significant impact on customer satisfaction, and the City should DEFINITELY increase emphasis on items in this area.
- Less Important (below average importance and below average satisfaction). This area shows where the City is not performing well relative to its performance in other areas; however, this area is generally considered to be less important to residents. This area does not significantly affect overall satisfaction with City services because the items are less important to residents. The agency should maintain current levels of emphasis on items in this area.



- I live in a townhome complex and we have had random people walking through looking for opportunities to steal. Crimes of opportunity. With that I worry about walking my dog at night and coming across a situation like that. I've called the non emergency number before to report shady behavior
- I live in Kiwanis, and I have worried in the past about erratic drivers and carburetors being stolen off of car. But overall I'm very pleased with the safety of Tempe, and my neighborhood. I've occasionally had weird late-night encounters at the Town Lake.

- I live on Carver Rd in S. Tempe. This road and Mill Ave have become drag strips at night. I used to love going to Mill Ave in the evening. There are several restaurants on Mill that are wonderful, however I almost got mugged walking to the parking garage off Mill. Luckily, my daughter and her boyfriend were coming around the corner when these two guys were about ready to rob me. My son later told me that they usually work in pairs....one disturbs the victim while the other grabs the victim's purse. I'm in my 60s, so I'm sure they thought I was an easy target. I won't go to Mill Ave anymore. If I go out to dinner, I usually frequent the restaurants in S. Tempe.
- I really appreciate our Police Officers but we don't have enough of them. Don't think the Tempe Counsel are doing their job well and it shows. More and more people in our neighborhood all agree. I will be voting differently with hopes for improving our neighborhood. When we call about problems they ignore them. ??
- I very rarely ever see patrol cars so I think some of the reason for increased crime is unfortunately staffing shortages. I'd like to see the basic laws enforced that we have on the books now. Property crime such as catalytic converter thefts and other crimes of opportunity seem to have increased a lot. Maybe some community outreach about crime prevention would help? Maybe making the neighborhood watch program less cumbersome to create would help. Working in conjunction with other City services to get to the root of crime is an ongoing process. Why do people steal? Need? kicks? pathological behavior? career criminal? But it boils down to having enough staff to cover all the areas of needs so you all aren't in the position of having to choose priorities. To me, property theft is a big issue, but if the department is short-staffed, violent crime takes priority. Overall, I feel safe in Tempe and have lived here for 50 years.
- I want to be able to trust Tempe PD to be compassionate, helpful and of service -- not aggressive, dismissive, rude as I've experienced in the past.
- I want to feel physically safe as a woman walking around Tempe at night.
- I worry about the population experiencing homelessness. It's not that I feel specifically threatened or unsafe knowing there are homeless people in my community, rather I worry for their health and safety.

- In Peterson Park neighborhood, we have vehicle driving too fast while they are cutting through to avoid the traffic signal at Priest and Southern.
- In reading about the services to assist unsheltered persons, I understand that the city is working on solutions that support positive outcomes for all. Therefore, the recent encampments and drug-running through the alley is being addressed.
- In the past 3-4 years N Tempe seems to be overrun with homeless and drug users wandering the neighborhood, parks and public streets. As a daily user of Papago and Hallman Parks, the amount of camps, trash and overnight campers has grown exponentially. I have frequently had to use the Tempe PD non-emergency number, the Tempe 311 app and more recently, the new Encampment Reporting website to try and get these areas addressed. There appears to be an entire small village in the riverbed immediately below the Tempe Marketplace bike path. There are areas of Scottsdale Road between the freeway and McKellips Road were almost every bus stop has some sketchy looking person or people just hanging out with all their 'belongings' and when they move on, they leave their garbage and other items behind. This is not just a late night situation, they are out there at all times of the day and every day of the week. I would not feel safe having a child or other family member go to those transit stops or some of the parks and picnic areas given what is happening in these locations. I am a very tolerant and sympathetic person and feel badly for people in this circumstance, but as a long-time taxpayer and a lover of

- my town, it's getting increasingly more uncomfortable to see what is happening around our neighborhood.

- Tempe needs to get serious about homelessness. It is illegal to sleep on the street. Homeless people come into my complex and sleep on peoples porches and police won't even come when called.

It would be great if we could have mailers / meetings at local parks to help educate people. The local police had a meeting with my neighborhood last year at Svob park to educate those that showed.... that was a huge step in the right direction. I call quite often on vagrants in my alley and the police response had been great. I am all for hiring more on the force and raising wages to get higher quality / more applicants to select from. Also, maybe educate people that the alleys are not public property. I think many people do not understand the importance of that. Thank you for listening and all you do. Have a great day!

It's really disgusting and definitely does not feel safe whatsoever. Kiwanis park is fine, just avoid certain tucked away areas which have the homeless.

Tempe Beach is horrible, with the litter and the homeless. So sad. Mill Ave and A mountain same.

- The canals. A lot of homeless people hang out there and done feel completely safe or comfortable exercising along there
- The dug addicted homeless population.
- the fact there are many homeless people in our neighborhoods that need help and public safety
  doesn't just apply to myself but it applies to everyone. we're experiencing extreme heat waves
  and people die outside. then in the winter people freeze. it's a serious public health concern to
  have hundreds of people living in our parks and at our bus stops. most of the time people are
  calm, friendly, easy going. sometimes having people living at bus stops makes people feel
  uncomfortable and unsafe.
- The growing homeless population and theft.
- The hazard of heat in order to use outdoor public facilities to their fullest, access to shade and water (particularly bottle refill stations, since those are more sanitary) are essential, especially for the unhoused who are forced to rely on these public spaces to survive.
- The homeless- although I've noted the city is aggressively trying to shelter them.
- The homeless and drug presence has increased significantly. I don't feel safe taking my dog for a walk or even taking the trash out in the alley. The police have been great at responding when I have to call them in, but the constant feeling of bad people being all around is very unnerving.
- The homeless and their drugs, violence, and garbage. I'm not comfortable with them here at all.
   I don't understand why they are tearing down Gilliland middle school!! Wouldn't be more cost effective to remodel the school that's already there?
- The homeless camping in the alleyways at night.
- The homeless drug addict's that you let stay in our city!
- The homeless have gotten out of control. For a while they were camping out in tents along the canal. All along Baseline from I-10 to Hardy I'd full of them. It's no one or two it's groups. It's getting bad and their trash is everywhere.
- The homeless in Tempe.
- The homeless issue is out of hand. We need to start enforcing laws we have and make. We can continue to allow these people to get away with breaking the law. I will never allow my children to ride their bikes around the neighborhood by themselves. What kind of city have you allowed this to become, to make it scary for our children to go out and ride bikes.
- The homeless people are everywhere! I used to walk around my neighborhood and go to the parks now I do not due to the homeless setting up camp outside of the Fry's store at Mill and Southern just to name one place. The homeless people are also in Dwight Park down the street from my home. I also see them walking down the alleys.
- The homeless population has increased in various areas of our city but believe the vast majority gravitates closer to our home. Understand the issue of homelessness continues to grow not only in our state but around the country, however, it starts to worry us when you see drug addicts hanging out around the corner or worse, hang out in public areas of our complex.
- The homeless population will continue to grow as housing prices continue to price people out of rentals. There is already an issue with drug addicts around the light rail. We need more social safety programs and homeless outreach.
- The homeless. It's hot. They have no where to go. They get into subdivisions. We do not know if they are mentally challenged or just hot and tired. I'm afraid of being confronted. I'm an older single female and need to be aware of my surroundings and do all I can to keep me safe.
- THE HOMELESS-MOST IN THIS NEIGHBORHOOD WERE/ARE ON DRUGS

- The homelessness.
- The increase in homeless population as noted by set of camp with midday sleeping on well trafficked side walks. In addition, leaving shopping carts, stroller, food products in these sidewalks with not enough room for a bicycle with a trailer for children. Specifically the Warner Rd and I10 sidewalks in both East and West bound.
- The increase in the homeless population in our neighborhood. And, interestingly, you didn't ask about that at all.
- The increase of non-owner-occupied homes
- The increased number of short-term rental houses in the neighborhood.
- The lack of good sun protection on sidewalks and walking paths making it more unbearable to
  walk places and increasing heatstroke's. Also lack of good traffic calming beyond speed bumps,
  things like narrowed roads for pedestrian crossing and continuous sidewalks would help
  increase pedestrian safety. As well as a lack of measures to reduce car fatalities by redesigning
  roads and building more safety measures like roundabouts
- The lights at night when walking my dogs. At Campbell park in Tempe there is not enough lights to see what's in front of you. Coyotes are around so it limits where we go.
- The meth lab we keep reporting, yet getting no visible follow up.
- The most important issue is Homeless and all of its various issues. I feel very uncomfortable and have started not riding or walking at night along bike paths going to Tempe town lake and Indian bend. The large number of homeless that hang out on Scottsdale road. I was surprised to see people sleeping on Scottsdale rd at 10pm as I walked home from an event at ASU. I have stopped riding my bicycle to Tempe lake as homeless sleep in parks along Curry. I have reported that next store rental home had been broken into twice this last year and my residence had been accessed thru the alley and tools and house wire and copper piping were stolen in late 2020. Now I notify my neighbors and friends when I am going anywhere to keep an eye on my residence. I realize that police are a precious commodity. and it is really City government's responsibility to keep us safe. I am glad that we do not experience what 7th ave in Phoenix has to deal with. And since we are near ASU, there is a larger police presence to protect students. Please recognize that public safety is the most important issue that you face.
- The number of homeless has increased the last few years and there are numerous "impromptu" camps along the bike path and canal paths. This is a concern.
- The number of short term rentals; the excessive illegal fireworks
- The park at night, because there's always trash and stuff in the street in the mornings, so I don't know what's going on there overnight.
- The Pepperwood Townhomes HOA and it's management company (Tri City) have shown a strong history of discrimination, of showing favoritism to members who are not of color or renters (vs. homeowners) and are constantly breaking their own rules and regulations, with the management company not doing anything about it. They have been operating with an even number of board members for an extended period of time, which is against the rules and regulations (they're required to have an odd number of members, ranging from 5 people to 9 people). There have also been instances of board members "going rogue" and assaulting community members in the past, with no consequences. We have 3 community pools which have recently had 3+ cameras installed at each, against community concerns of privacy, and it's still unclear who from the board has access to this footage (of children and adults in swimming suits), and why they should have access. No one who serves on the board gets a background check or anything similar, so there could potentially be someone with history of pedophilia/sexual addiction/etc. currently accessing this sensitive footage and/or distributing it.

It is also known that the current President/Treasurer posted multiple "neighborhood watch" signs up around the neighborhood, when we have never had a community watch program, nor do we currently. Myself and other neighbors who have been continually harassed and discriminated against by the HOA board are very concerned about this behavior continuing and would very much like to know who we can contact about it to hopefully put an end to it.

- The percentage of people living on the streets that have metal health issues is higher than 50% and they harass, verbally assault and many times physically assault citizens nearly everyday within a 3 mile radius of ASU. This includes downtown. It is so unsafe on university and Ash at Circle K. Nothing is ever done. Circle k finally got new management that will no longer tolerate the loitering and harassment of customers but it doesn't seem like PD or City cared. Why should I have to walk out of my way to avoid the people that stay at the bus stop outside blaze pizza because they verbally assaulted and harass everyone. The shooting at Starbucks???? Why have we the residents not heard what happened? It wasn't just on Citizen app but my son works there and was there when it happened. Do you know how many employees not only there but around there are scared? Mill is such a beautiful place as is all of Tempe. Why can't ASU, Valley Metro, Tempe PD and the City work together to make this college town safe? Don't just think of the residents. Think of the college students. Tempe is my favorite city. I've fell in love immediately a few years ago.
- The police department is wonderful. The laws and the courts are the problem, along with the tolerance of homelessness, petty crime, drug use, panhandling, etc.
- The residential complexes are not properly secured and happened to be frequently burglarized.
  The city has grown far too fast for the lack of resources. Was shot at by pellet gun assailant who
  broke into sky water apartments Rio Salado roof top and targeted myself my dog and others.
  Police did what they could but it was like living a video game! I'm worried of the dangerous
  criminals that are now dwelling in and around the city.
- the unsheltered living near AZ Mills Mall
- The unsheltered population is out of control. PLEASE find solutions that get them off our streets and help them improve their lives. Increased homelessness increases the feeling of being unsafe.
- The vegetation along the western canal (I maintained portions) is overgrown and a fire hazard. Tempe only maintains the developed portions. This is a ridiculous policy that has recently been put in place. Why? It is stupid and senseless.

- There has been one recent theft but generally my neighborhood feels very safe. My number one
  concern is feeling secure staying here with my baby daughter as we raise her and she is a kid in
  our neighborhood, walking to school, using the park, etc. I am comfortable in my neighborhood
  currently.
- There is a homeless issue in south Tempe, but not to the degree of some other areas. I don't know that this is a safety issue necessarily. But it's the only thing that causes me concern.
- There is a homeless problem clearly, everywhere. It is uncomfortable to go into convince stores, grocery stores and gas stations. Forget about the park. Won't go there. I don't feel comfortable in my neighborhood either and worry about my home being broken into regardless of if I am home or not.
- There is no place for our unhoused neighbors to go at night, so they are sometimes in the parking lot of my apartment complex. Sometimes there is yelling, and once a fight broke out.
- There is no safety concerns at this time.
- There is street racing that happens almost every night along college and Scottsdale road near
  mckellips. Nothing is being done about it and these are high traffic areas. Someone is going to
  get hurt or killed. Also, there are lots of shady characters that hang it around the motel 6 on
  Scottsdale and Hancock which makes the area feel unsafe.
- Too many cars parked at one home and many times different cars. What's going on at this home? Drugs?

to help the homeless. We have had a guy OD and die in our front yard, been robbed, had a knife pulled on me, car broken into, found a gun thrown in our backyard.... We are 100% done. We loved Tempe and have lived here for 14 years, but we can't justify the out of control police department and amount of crime. My family needs to be safe!

- We don't have a neighborhood association or even a Facebook group. I contacted the appropriate dept at the city about organizing this and didn't get an answer. I think it would help us feel safer.
- We don't worry much for ourselves, but there is a visible population in Tempe (sadly, as
  everywhere) of people experiencing homelessness. Where can they go during the heat of the
  day? Where can they sleep at night?
- We have people experiencing homeless in the neighborhood, and that will be more frequent
  when services are built at the library complex. So far, I've heard nothing about plans to keep the
  neighborhoods from getting a negative impact from this. I am also very concerned about
  increased vehicle traffic when that complex is built out.
- We have speed bumps, but they do not slow down the speeders.
- We live in Warner Ranch. Overall very safe, but occasionally we will get people from other areas that wonder in and still bikes from an open garage, but otherwise pretty safe.
- WE NEED CAMERAS AND/OR PATROL IN PARKS AND ALONG CANAL
- We need to get control of the homeless problem, they are destroying our parks and making our
  city dirty and ugly. If you are brave enough to attempt to go to downtown mill you have to be
  prepared to step over or around homeless people to enter a business. Also the graffiti in the city
  is getting out of control.
- We need to solve the underlying challenges of unhoused people. This is not a job for the police, and using the police as if they can solve it will exacerbate the problems. We need to find ways to provide safe housing for those who need it. Drugs (and the associated behaviors) are the main reason that I feel unsafe in my community, but they don't get "solved" meaningfully by calling the police on someone. The challenges are community-wide, and that is where we need to address the challenges. We all need to have meaning and purpose in our lives, and turning to drugs is a symptom of broader social challenges.

- When people approach you for money in the parking lots at the store. There are times that I have given money or food to the homeless standing on the corners but I do not like it when they have approached me in the parking lot.
- While I reside on a cul-de-sac, the excessive speeds at which residents drive on the interstates
  and side roads is alarming. There doesn't seem to be ANY speed/traffic controls. We're missing
  an opportunity to generate some real money for the city/county by not handing out more
  speeding tickets.
- Working to deal with homeless and their mental health. Most of them are harmless, but never comfortable and never know what might set a person off.
- Worrying about being shot by the police. I'm sorry, but I don't trust them anymore.
- Wrong type of traffic enforcement. Throwing the book at a 21 year old who checks a Google
  Maps screen on a cell phone and has never had a ticket is wrong. Yet, traffic enforcement
  NEVER patrols the school crosswalk I work, and every day people speed through way over 15

- mph, and every few days do not stop while children are present in the crosswalk. Will it take a CNN story if a child is killed by a driver going 50 mph in a Tempe school zone to get traffic enforcement to adjust their priorities?
